-Too heavy salting destroys the flavor of good butter.

-Stirring the cream frequently will make more butter.

-If you want the flow of milk to keep

up always milk clean. -Pack as soon as possible after salting if you want to keep butter.



-There is an old and true saying that "love lightens labor." When we take an interest in our work the hardness of it is half overcome. Dairying is much barder work than poultry keeping, but if a man has no love for poultry keeping and does the work only because he has to it is more laborious than working in a dairy. The difference very much depends upon the state of mind in which we view them.

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-A Denver paper tells about two neigh-bors up in the divide country, Colorado, who each sold a carload of steers to the same buyer on the Denver market. The first carload were grade shorthoros, the get of good dams and registered bulls. They were long yearlings and netted \$36.65 per head. The other carload belonging to the neighbor living across the way were long two-year-olds and were the progeny of just cows and most any kind of bulls that were cheap and had horns. They netted \$19.85 a head.

-All things considered, wheat, bran and middlings are as good, if not better, than any other foods. Such feeds as gluten and oil meal are good for milk, but are deficient in minerals that the animal requires. Cows should have some miveral matter. There is a greater amount of mineral matter in wheat bran than in any other feeds. But a mixture of wheat tran and gluten half and half, with good ensilage, will make a very good ration and is more commonly fed than any of the bought feeds in the best dairy secti
