-If you have had your last season's Gladiolus bulbs stored in the cellar or other frost proof place, where they should be put each Fall after drying off, remember in setting them out the strongest bulbs should be kept until the last planting.

-When the hog seems to be losing the use of its limbs, feed less corn and more bran and oats chop. If the trouble is very bad, give 8 or 10 drops of nox vumica in the feed twice a day. Keep the bowells open by feeding an abundance of green feed.

-When a calf does not seem to thrive it is recommended to give it a half-pint of wheat bran, with a pinch of salt, scalded with a teacupful of hot water. Give this with the usual amount of milk and always keep some corn, oats and hay with pure water handy.

-Gladiolus bulbs should be planted six inches apart in beds or double rows, and should be set about three inches deep. While they will grow in almost any soil they give much better and bigger spikes if the ground is enriched and they are occasionally watered with liquid manure.

-While most of the wall flowers are perennials and do best from seed planted the year previous and protected in the cold frame all Winter, there is one variety, the Paris Extra Early, which can be treat-ed as an annual and will bloom from seed sown as soon as danger of frost is past.

-Among the daintiest of the Summer -Among the daintiest of the Summer flowering bulbs are the Fairy Lillies or Zephyranthes. Try some of them this sea-son, as they bloom profusely. Mass them either in the pure white or pinks or in a combination of the two. They should go in the front of a hed or horder, as they grow but eight inches high.

-A Pennsylvania driryman reports that he kept a record of 80 calves, which con-sumed 12,000 quarts of milk, for which he sumed 12.000 quarts of milk, for which he received \$481, or over four cents a quart, and the calves did the milking. He esti-mates that it takes 146 quarts of milk to make a calf four weeks old, which will weigh 160 pounds if they have Holstein

-It is claimed that frequent applications of hot water to the roots of peach trees keep the roots free from grabs. The bark just under the ground will be greenish yellow. The soil should be dag away from the tranks and loose soil and leaves raked up against them. These can be removed with the bands when the hot water is to be applied. The hot water stimulates the flow of sap and the trees bear better.

-Colic in our horses, says an English -Colic in our horses, says an English veterinarian, is generally the result of care-less or improper feeding. The stomach of the horse eis small and the digestion is limited, and if the horse is hungry and overfed or is allowed to gulp down a big feed colic is the result.
