Constitutional Amendments.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION SUBMITTED TO THE CITIZENS OF THIS COMMONWEALTH FOR THEIR APPROVAL OR REJECTION. BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA, AND PUBLISHED BY ORDER OF THE SECRETARY OF THE COMMONWEALTH. IN PURSUANCE OF ARTICLE XVIII OF THE CONSTITUTION.

A JOINT RESOLUTION. Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, so as to consolidate the courts of Common Pleas of Al-

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met. That the following amendment to the Constitution of Pennsylvania be, and the same is hereby, proposed, in accordance with the eighteenth article thereof.

That section six of article five be amended, by striking out the said section, and inserting in place thereof the following: Section 6. In the county of Philadelphia all the jurisdiction and powers now vested in the district courts and courts of Common Pleas, subject to such changes as may be made by this Constitution or by law, shall be in Philadelphia vested in five distinct and seconds courts of common pleas. to such changes as may be made by this Constitution or by law, shall be in Philadelphia vested in
five distinct and separate courts of equal and coordinate jurisdiction, composed of three judges
each. The said courts in Philadelphia shall be
designated respectively as the court of Common
Pleas number one, number two, number three,
number four and number five, but the number of
said courts may be by law increased, from time to
time, and shall be in like manner designated by
successive numbers. The number of judges in
any of said courts, or in any county where the establishment of an additional court may be authorized by law, may be increased, from time to time,
and whenever such increase shall amount: in the
whole to three, such three judges shall compose
a distinct and separate court as aforesaid, which
shall be numbered as aforesaid. In Philadelphia
all suits shall be instituted in the said courts of
Common Pleas without designating the number
of the said court, and the several courts shall distribute and apportion the business among tnem in
such manner as shall be provided by rules of
court, and each court, to which any suit shall be
thus assigned, shall have exclusive jurisdiction
thereof, subject to change of venue, as shall be
provided by law.

In the county of Allegheny all the jurisdiction

provided by law.

In the county of Allegheny all the jurisdiction and powers now vested in the several numbered courts of Common Pleas shall be vested in one court of Common Pleas, composed of all the judges in commission in said courts. Such jurisdiction and powers shall extend to all proceedings at law and in equity which shall have been instituted in the several numbered courts, and shall be subject to such changes as may be made by law, and subject to change of venue as provided by law. The president judge of said court shall be selected as provided by law. The number of judges in said court may be by law increased from time to time. This amendment shall take effect on the first day of January succeeding its adoption.

> Number Two. A JOINT RESOLUTION.

Proposing an amendment to section eight, article nine, of the Constitution of Pennsylvania. Section 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and louse of Representatives of the Commonwealth f Pennsylvania in General Assembly met. That he following is proposed as an amendment to the onstitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in accordance with the provisions of the ighteenth article thereof:—

Amendment to Article Nine, Section Eight, ection 2. Amend section eight, articlenine, of Constitution of Pennsylvania. which reads as

"Section 8. The debt of any county, city, bor ough, township, school district or other municipality or incorporated district, except as herein provided, shall never exceed seven per centum upon the assessed value of the taxable property therein, nor shall any such municipality or disdrict incur any new debt, or increase its indebtedness to an amount exceeding two per centum upon such assessed valuation of property, without the assent of the electors thereof at a public election in such manner as shall be provided by law; but any city, the debt of which now exceeds seven per centum of such assessed valuation, may be authorized by law to increase the same three per centum, in the aggregate, at any one time, upon such valuation, so as to read as follows:—

Section 8. The debt of any county, city, bor-

centum, in the aggregate, at any one time, upon such valuation, so as to read as follows:—

Section 8. The debt of any county, city, borough, township, school district, or any municipality or incorporated district, except as herein provived, shall never exceed seven per centum upon the assessed value of the taxable property therein, nor shall any such municipality or district incur any new debt, or increase its indebtedness to an amount exceeding two per centum upon such assessed valuation of property, without the assent of the electors thereof at a public election in such manner as shall be provided by law; but any city, the debt of which now exceeds seven per centum if such assessed valuation, may be authorized by law to increase the same three per centum, in the aggregate, at any one time, upon such valuation, except that any debt or debts hereinafter incurred by the city and county of Philadelphia for the construction and development of subways for transit purposes, or for the construction of wharves and docks, or the reclamation of land to be used in the construction of a system of wharves and docks, as public improvements, owned or to be owned by said city and county of Philadelphia, and which shall yield to the city and county of Philadelphia current net revenue in excess of the interest on said debt or debts and of the annual installments necessary for the cancellation of said debt or debts, may be excluded in ascertaining
