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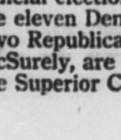
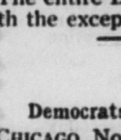
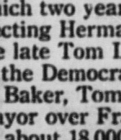
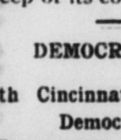
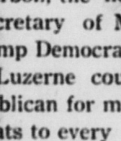
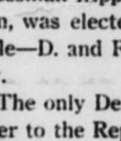
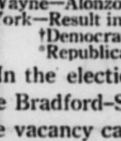
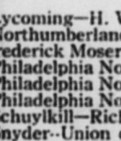
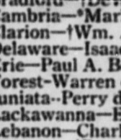
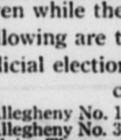
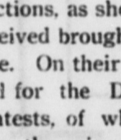
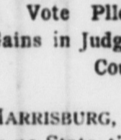
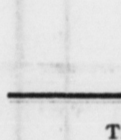

NEW JERSEY.

Republicans Make Gain in Senators and Members of the Legislature.

TRENTON, N. J., Nov. 7.—Returns indicate that the Republicans will control both branches of the Legislature next winter. Gloucester county, which, according to early returns, was in doubt, elected a Republican Senator, and this will make the Senate stand eleven Republicans and ten Democrats.

The election of a Congressman in the Bradford-Susquehanna district, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Congressman Kipp, W. D. B. Ainey, Republican, was elected over Dr. W. H. Rockville—D. and F., by a substantial majority.

THE STATE.

Big Vote Piled Showing Democratic Gains in Judges, Mayors, and a Few County Tickets.

HARRISBURG, Nov. 8.—Although there was no State ticket to elect, the county elections, as shown by the returns so far received brought out an unusually large vote. On their vote the gains were general for the Democrats.

The only Democratic county that went over to the Republicans in the State, was Carbon, the home of James I. Blakeslee, secretary of Mr. George W. Guthrie's rump Democratic State committee.

Luzerne county, which has been Republican for many years, elected Democrats to every office and made a clean sweep of its court house officials.

DEMOCRATS WIN IN OHIO.

Both Cincinnati and Cleveland Elected Democratic City Tickets. CLEVELAND, Ohio, Nov. 7.—Cleveland, which two years ago went Republican, electing Herman C. Baher, mayor over the late Tom L. Johnson today returned to the Democratic fold, electing Newton D. Baker, Tom L. Johnson's political heir, mayor over Frank C. Hogan, Republican, by about 18,000 majority.

The entire Democratic city ticket won with the exception of five councilmen.

ILLINOIS.

Democrats Make Gain of Judge. CHICAGO, Nov. 7.—Early returns in the judicial election here indicate that nine of the eleven Democrats have been elected. Two Republicans, Judges Kavanaugh and McSurely, are thought to be chosen for the Superior Court.

PHILADELPHIA.

Democrats and Keynoters Succeeded in Electing Mayor, City Solicitor, Three of the Six Magistrates and an Increased Number of Councilmen. Official returns of Tuesday's election show that Rudolph Blankenburg, independent nominee, has been elected mayor over Geo. H. Earle, Jr., organization candidate, by a majority of 4797. Blankenburg received 135,139 votes, against 130,342 for Earle.

Blankenburg, however, ran ahead of his ticket, and the organization succeeded in electing most of its candidates for the other offices. One Republican candidate for magistrate went down to defeat, the independents electing all three of their candidates, and the city solicitorship is in doubt, with the chances favoring the election of Michael J. Ryan over James Alcorn, present incumbent. Each claimed his election last night, but it will take the official to settle it.

With one division of the city missing, an unofficial computation of the vote for the city solicitorship shows that Michael J. Ryan, Keystone-Democratic nominee, defeated James Alcorn, Republican, by a majority of 1579 votes.

IRA GARMAN, a former resident of Bellefonte, was elected Select Councilman, by the Democrats and reformers, from a district heretofore giving an overwhelming Ring majority.

MASSACHUSETTS.

Stands by Her Democracy. BOSTON, MASS., Nov. 9.—Complete returns show the re-election of Governor Foss by a larger majority than was given him last year. As the issue in this State was open and distinctly on the tariff question, Massachusetts can be put down as permanently in the Democratic columns when that question is at issue.

KANSAS.

Democrats Gain Congressmen. IOLA, Kan., Nov. 7.—Iola complete gives Joseph A. Taggart, Democrat, for Congress in the Second Kansas district, two hundred majority over Ulysses S. Guyer, Republican. The same city in 1910 gave A. C. Mitchell, Republican, for whose seat Taggart and Guyer are contesting, a majority of approximately three hundred.

MARYLAND.

Elects Republican Governor, but Other Offices and Legislature Go to Democrats.

BALTIMORE, Nov. 8.—Republican jubilation this morning over the result of yesterday's election became much subdued this afternoon as the returns began to filter in from the counties. While the figures are far from complete, tonight, they show that the Republicans, instead of sweeping the State, as they thought, merely elected their Governor, Phillips Lee Goldsborough, by a majority that may not reach 3000.

The incomplete figures also indicate that the Democrats retained control of the Legislature and elected Edgar Allan Poe Attorney General and Emerson C. Harrington Comptroller. All three Democratic candidates for Judges of the Supreme bench in Baltimore city were elected, but the Republicans re-elected Judge Henry Stockbridge to the State Court of Appeals.

DEMOCRATIC LANDSLIDE IN KENTUCKY.

McCreary, Democrat, Elected Governor by 30,000 to 40,000. LOUISVILLE, KY., Nov. 7.—Kentucky for years considered in the balance between the Democrats and Republicans today went back into the ranks of the former in a landslide victory. Returns tonight indicated that James B. McCreary, Democratic candidate for Governor, had been elected by from 30,000 to 40,000 majority. His opponent was Judge Edward C. O'Rear.

The Herald and Post, both of which supported the Republican ticket, conceded McCreary's election by 40,000, but figures taken from all sources hardly justify such an estimate.

NEW MEXICO ELECTS DEMOCRAT GOVERNOR.

Legislature in Doubt. SANTA FE, N. M., Nov. 7.—With returns far from complete W. C. McDonald, Democratic candidate for Governor of New Mexico, has a probable majority of between 1250 and 1500. In its first election as a State New Mexico has repudiated its old reactionary control.

The Republicans have elected Frank W. Clancy Attorney General and George Curry Congressman. H. B. Furgusson, Democrat, is also elected to Congress. The Legislature may be Republican. Whether W. H. (Bull) Andrews, the Pennsylvania carpetbagger, will be elected to the United States Senate is doubtful.

ADDITIONAL LOCAL NEWS.

WORK NOW IN PROGRESS ON HIGH STREET BRIDGE.—Last Friday evening a force of bridge builders from the York Bridge company arrived in Bellefonte and on Monday morning began work on tearing away the old structure for replacing the antique High street bridge with a new and modern one. The bridge will be built with steel girders across the creek and with a concrete and brick roadway. There will be no trusses to impede travel, the only thing above ground being the guard rails at each side. The bridge has been in a torn up condition since early last spring and the fact that a new one will be built before winter sets in is a cause for thankfulness not only by every resident and business man in this section, but everybody who travels the streets of Bellefonte, as ninety-nine out of every one hundred cross the bridge one or more times during the day.

Now that the bridge is being built, borough council will also fix up the street between the High street and the race bridges, paving the same with brick. New street lights will be placed in this portion of town and when everything is completed it will not only be more durable but will make the section of town traveled by every person who comes to Bellefonte by train, more like what it should have been this long time.

REGARDING RAFFLING MATCHES.—Several weeks ago Burgess John J. Bower issued a proclamation prohibiting all raffling or hustling matches for turkeys, chickens or fowls of any kind, as it is against the law, and gave instructions to the police to arrest any and all offenders.

So far as known no attempt has been made by anyone to pull off anything of the kind within the borough limits this season. But on Monday night a raffling match for turkeys was held just outside the borough limits in Spring township, and if the township authorities are going to allow such infraction of the law the prohibition in Bellefonte will not accomplish the good it is intended to do. Whether the Spring township authorities were aware of Monday night's raffling match is not known, but if they were they are liable to answer to the court for neglect of duty. In cases where the township authorities fail to act the sheriff has full power to go anywhere and it is his duty to see that the law in this respect is observed. It might here be added for the benefit of all parties inclined to hold raffling matches that a number of dealers and business men in Bellefonte are determined to break up the practice and will inform on anyone participating in same; so if you wish to avoid the possibility of arrest keep out of the business.

MURPHY—HARTSOCK.—A very pretty wedding was solemnized at the parsonage of the Simpson Methodist Episcopal church, Scranton, on the evening of November 1st, when Miss Sara Gray Hartsock, of Buffalo Run, Pa., became the bride of J. Linn Murphy, of New York city. The couple entered the parlor accompanied by the bride's niece, Ruth Hartsock, carrying the ring. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Frank D. Hartsock, of Scranton, and Rev. B. Willis Hartsock, of Liverpool, Pa., brothers of the bride. An elegant wedding dinner was served, after which the happy couple departed for New York city where they will make their future home.
