

"I did, sir," answered the witness. Witness admitted that the lifeboat he commanded could have held twenty-five or thirty more persons than the forty-five who had been ordered into it. Women wept as this testimony was given, and the witness himself bowed his head and lowered his voice as he answered the questions put to him by Senator Smith.

Lookout Saw Icebehg.

Frederick T. Fleet, seaman and the lookout man on the Titanic, followed Third Officer Pitman on the stand. Fleet, with another seaman named Lee, was stationed in the crow's nest or lookout from 10 o'clock Sunday night until the time of the accident. He reported, he said on the stand, the iceberg ahead as soon as he saw it. He said he was unable, however, to give any idea how long before the collision he reported ice ahead or how far ahead the iceberg was. He struck three bells first when he sighted it and then went to the telephone in the crow's nest and rang the officers on the bridge up. The person who answered asked him what he saw, and witness told him an iceberg was ahead. The three bells was to notify the people on the bridge that something was ahead. 
