Is Local Option Legal?

The constitution of Pennsylvania, Article 3, section 7, provides inter alia as follows: "The General Assembly shall not pass any local or special law regulating the affairs of counties, cities, townships, wards, boroughs or school districts."

The Supreme court of this State in passing on the above clause has said: "All our recent decisions are to the effect, that if local results either are or may be produced by a piece of legislation, it offends against this provision of the constitution and is void."
