

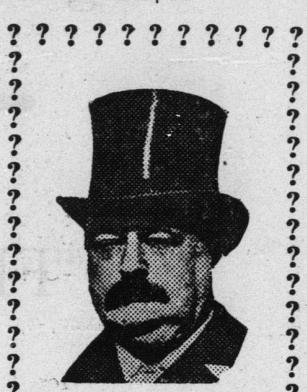
THE SIEGE OF PENROSE
