Insects Worth Protecting. Among the common insects of the household are two which are friends of the housewife. If she realized this fact, she would protect them, instead of taking every opportunity to kill them. One of them is the spider, and the other is the so-called "centipede," or "earwig." But the latter is neither an earwig (which is quite a different kind of creature), not yet a centipede. It is a "myriapod," and has fifteen pairs of legs. Like the spider, it is precaceous, attacking and devouring flies and other "undesirables."
