Killed in a Coal Mine.
Edward Eckley was killed while working in the coal mine of the Harbison-Walker Refractories company at Woodland, on Tuesday morning, by a fall of coal, death being instantaneous.

He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Reuben Eckley and was born on Buffalo Run, this county, about thirty-seven years ago. His early life was spent on Buffalo Run but a few years ago he located at Chester Hill and went to work as a coal miner for the Harbison-Walker people at Woodland. He was a sober, industrious gentleman and had many friends who sincerely mourn his untimely death.

He is survived by his wife and five small children; his invalid father, who made his home with him, and three brothers, Samuel, of Clearfield; Calvin, of Erie, and Willis, of Blue Ball. Burial was made at Philipsburg yesterday.

Red Cross Stamps Here.
Miss Helen E. C. Overton has received her supply of Red Cross stamps for this year, a consignment of 5,000, and the same are now on sale in various business places around town. The stamp bears a picture of Santa Claus with a loaded pack on his back, one of the prettiest designs put out in years. These stamps can be used at Thanksgiving as well as the holiday season. And the "Zizz" No Longer Zizzles.
Philipsburg is a wide-awake town and its citizens in years past have been noted for their ingenuity in inventing things new and original, but according to the following dispatch from Harrisburg the inventor of a new drink called "zizz" is not meeting with exceptional success:

Harrisburg, Nov. 6.—Just at a time when Centre county was in a fair way to begin zizzling with "Zizz," the "temperance" drink that contains 4 per cent of alcohol, agents of the state dairy and

food department appeared, and now the "Zizz" no longer zizzles.
The "Zizz" dispensing station was found in the back end of a Philipsburg restaurant. The proprietor was a careful person who was very particular about whom he sold his concoction to. He was even more particular about where the fluid was consumed. The dairy and food agent, who purchased "Zizz," was told he could drink all he

liked, but that carrying "Zizz" away from the premises was strictly against the rules of the house. When the agent argued otherwise his sample, for which he had paid perfectly good money, was confiscated.
The agent departed and returned with a search warrant obtained with a view of enabling him to recover his stolen property. A plentiful supply of "Zizz" was located. Another find, a sort of

liquid lightning, that contained 12 per cent alcohol, and was listed as cider, was unearthed. There were also three non-alcoholic drinks on the premises that were misbranded.
The "Zizz" dispenser was fined \$125 on pure food department charges, and then turned over to District Attorney Furst, of Centre county, who will bring prosecutions under the Brooks high license law.

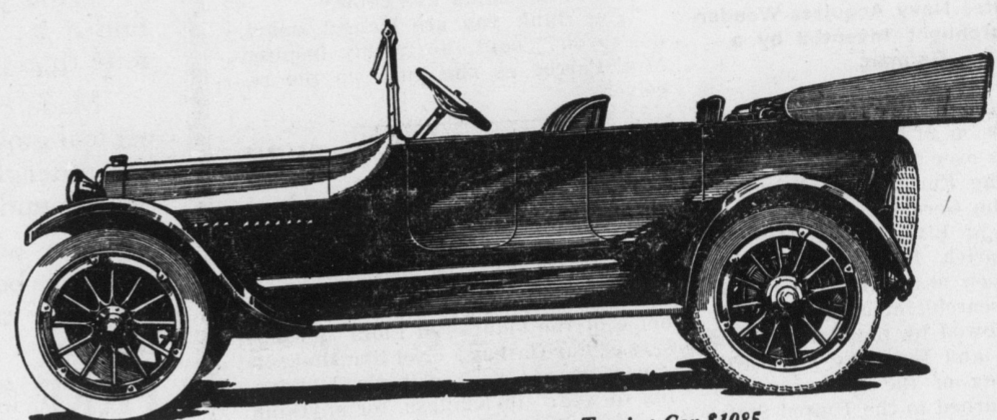
