Pennsylvania: All manufacturing users of sugar in the classes included under this plan must make statement of purchases and stocks, whether desiring to make

additional purchases or not. These statements are being filed very slowly and we ask you to get immediate publicity, calling attention of your local manufacturers using sugar to these statements, and explaining the absolute importance of their being filed immediately, even if they do not want any sugar until

after July first. If such statements are not filed immediately by the manufacturers, giving the government the data they must have at this time, such manufacturers may be penalized by a further reduction of their sugar supplies after

July first.

We urge the most prompt and vigorous action on your part in order that statements may be filed IMME-DIATELY by all of your manufacturing users of sugar.
