Camp Morrison, Va., Dec. 18. My Dear People of St. Johns: Since I cannot be with you for the Christmas season I feel as if a short message might be appropriate.

Over nineteen hundred years ago, on a frosty December night, a child was born in a stable in the little town of Bethlehem of Judea.

As the voices of herald angels echoed and re-echoed over the moonlit gardens, across the shining waters, and up the terraced hills, telling all nations that a King was born, that moment a new era was ushered in, and another upward step was carved into the steep granite pathway of the human race.

With the birth of the Babe of Bethlehem came new ideals, new hope, and a new and stronger love—principles that were destined to shape and mould character, and to lead the stumbling children of men nearer to the gates of heaven.

How often have these fundamental principles of righteousness been assailed by the forces of evil as the centuries have passed down the dusty corridors of time! Look at the red line of history and see the wars that have been caused, the battles that have been fought, the lives that have been lost, and the suffering that has been endured, all because of this struggle between Right and Wrong, between the ideals of Christ and the forces of sin.

And just now, in this beautiful Christmas season of 1918 the glittering star of Bethlehem—the very same star that led the wise men to the cradle of the Christ, looks down from its heavenly seat and smiles upon a blood-drenched, war-weary world at rest once more.

Think what particular significance is attached to the Christmas season this year! The war is over; the boys are coming home to brighter family fireplaces from a coast to coast. Rest has come to millions of shell-shocked, battle-scarred heroes.

And today as our eyes fall upon the crumbling ruins of a nation built upon the foundation stones of greed, lust, boastfulness, trickery, barbarism, and blood and iron militarism, and as we see our own nation still secure and firm, and her flag shining forth with added glories, we should realize more deeply, as the Bible tells us, that "righteousness exalteth a nation, but sin is a curse to any people."

And now as we look back and see how the nations have endured only when they were founded upon the ideals of Christ, shouldn't we pick up the lesson so clearly shown, and from day to day try to build our individual structures upon the eternal principles of righteousness and truth, and strive also to fashion our lives after the pattern of our blessed Lord and Savior?

With this appeal my Christmas message closes. Am more than sorry that I cannot be with you to share the joy and cheer of this happy season, but I hope to be with you before many weeks have passed.

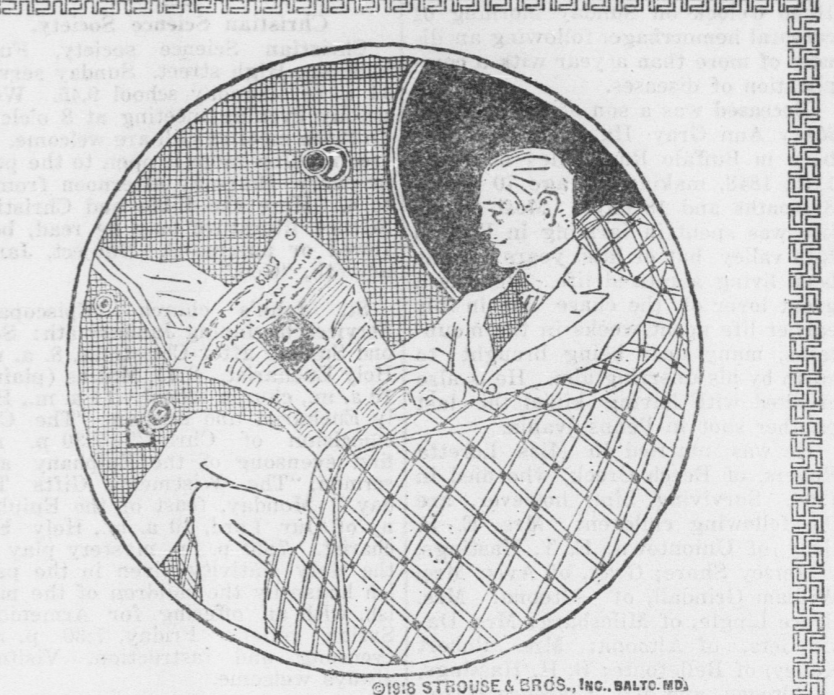

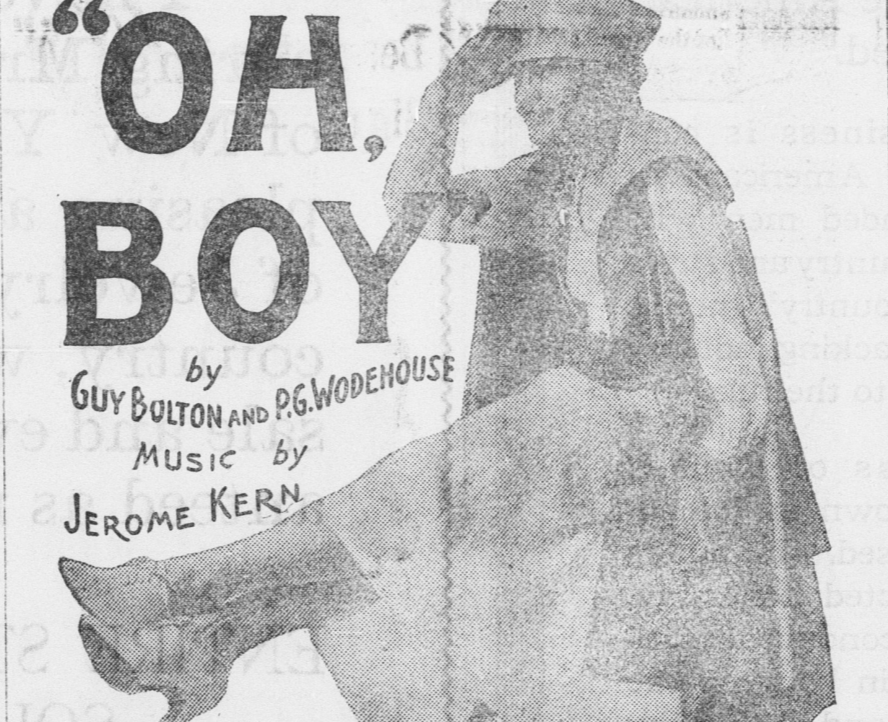
