

Election Proclamation

God save the Commonwealth. I, Harry Dukeman, High Sheriff of the County of Centre, Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, do hereby make known and give notice to the electors of the County aforesaid that an election will be held in the said County of Centre on the

FIRST TUESDAY IN NOVEMBER, 1920, being the 2nd of November

for the purpose of electing the several persons hereafter named, to wit:

Thirty-eight persons for Presidential Electors.

One person for United States Senator.

One person for State Treasurer.

One person for Auditor General.

One person for Judge of the Supreme Court.

One person for Judge of the Superior Court.

Four persons for Representatives in Congress at Large.

One person for Representative in Congress.

One person for Representative in the General Assembly.

SPECIMEN BALLOT

To vote a straight party ticket, mark a cross (X) in the square, in the first column, opposite the name of the party of your choice.

A Cross Mark in the Square at the head of a group of Presidential Electors, opposite the name of a Party and its Presidential candidates, is a vote for all the Electors of that Party, BUT

FOR NO OTHER CANDIDATES.

A cross mark in the square opposite the name of any candidate indicates a vote for that candidate.

To vote for a person whose name is not on the ballot, write or paste his name in the blank space provided for that purpose.

To vote for an individual candidate of another party after making a mark in the party square, mark a cross (X) opposite his name.

For an office where more than one candidate is to be elected, the voter, after marking in the party square, may divide his vote by marking a cross (X) to the right of each candidate for whom he desires to vote. For such office votes shall not be counted for candidates not individually marked.

A cross (X) in the party square in the first column does not carry a vote for any Judge.

To vote for Judge, mark a cross (X) opposite the name of the candidate desired.
