Know Your Potatoes.

As a part of the potato improvement program for Centre county J. N. Robinson, county agent, has arranged to hold several potato roguing demonstrations.

At these field meetings E. L. Nixon, extension plant pathologist, will point out the differences between diseased and hearty potato plants. It is absolutely impossible to detect many of the most serious potato diseases after the potatoes have been raised. The proper time to select your seed potatoes is during the growing season, hence these meetings will be held in the field and while the plants are still growing.

If you are at all interested in efficient potato production you can not afford to plant diseased potatoes. Attend one of these roguing demonstrations and then clean up enough of your own potato field to supply you with good healthy seed for the next spring. The schedule of meetings follows:
