PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION NO. 2.  Section 4. No debt shall be created by or on behalf of the State, except to supply casual deficiencies of revenue, repel invasion, suppress insurrection, defend the State in war, or to pay existing debt; and the debt created to supply deficiencies in revenue shall nover exceed in the aggregate at any one time, one million dollars: Provided, however, That the General Assembly, irrespective of any debt, may authorize the State to issue bonds to the amount of one hundred millions of dollars, for the purpose of improving and rebuilding the highways of the Comstitution No. 3  SHALL ARTICLE THREE OF THE CONSTITUTION BE AMENDED BY ADDING A SECTION TO READ AS FOLLOWS?  Section 34. All taxes shall be uniform, upon the same class of subjects, within the territorial limits of the authority levying the tax, and shall be levied and collected under general laws; but the General Assembly may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes, actual places of religious worship, places of burial not used or held for private or corporate profit, institutions of purely public charity, and real and personal property owned, occupied, and used by any branch, post, or camp of honorably discharged soldiers, sailors, and marines. No railroad, railway, or other transportation company shall grant free passes or passes at a discount to any person except officers or employees of the company and clergymen.
