Notice is hereby given that every person, excepting Justice of the Peace, who shall hold any office or appointment of profit or trust under the Government of the United States or this State, or of any City or Incorporated district, whether a commissioned officer or otherwise a subordinate officer or agent who is or shall be employed under the Legislative, Executive or Judiciary department of the State or the United States or of any city or incorporated district, and also that every member of Congress and of the State Legislature, and of the Select or Common Council of any city, or Commissioners of any incorporated district is, by law, incapable of holding or exercising at the same time the office or appointment of Judge, inspector or clerk of any district of this Commonwealth and that no inspector, judge or other officer of any such elections, shall be eligible to any office to be then voted for, except that an election officer.

Under the law of the Commonwealth for holding elections, the polls shall be open at 7 o'clock A. M. and closed at 7 o'clock P. M.

### SPECIMEN BALLOT

To vote a straight party ticket, mark a cross (X) in the square in the first column, opposite the name of the party of your choice.

A Cross Mark in the square at the head of a group of Presidential Electors, opposite the name of a Party and its Presidential candidates, is a vote for all the Electors of that Party, BUT FOR NO OTHER CANDIDATES.

A Cross Mark in the square opposite the name of any candidate indicates a vote for that candidate.

To vote for a person whose name is not on the ballot, write or paste his or her name in the blank space provided for that purpose. This shall count as a vote either with or without the Cross Mark.

To vote for an individual candidate of another pary after making a Mark in the party square, mark a Cross (X) opposite his or her name.

For an office where more than one candidate is to be elected, the voter, after marking in the party square, may divide his or her vote by marking a Cross (X) to the right of each candidate for whom he or she desires to vote. For such office votes shall not be counted for candidates not individually marked.
