

Electrocutions in Pennsylvania Number 140 Men.

Every few weeks some unfortunate individual is put to death in the chair at the Rockview penitentiary and it might be of interest to many people to know that since electrocution was made the legal mode of death for murderers in Pennsylvania just 140 men have gone to the chair.

The unfortunate individuals came from thirty-eight counties in the State. Allegheny county sent the largest number, 21; Dauphin was next with 13 and Philadelphia 12.

Twenty-nine counties in the State were not represented in the number of murderers electrocuted, Centre county being one of them.

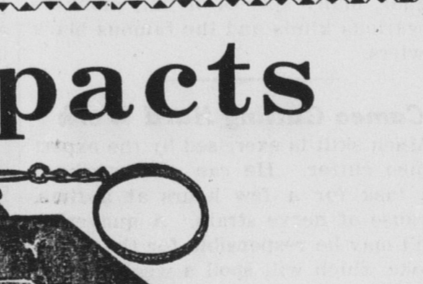
