Motor Cycle Races in Altoona Bowl July 5th.

Approximately 100 of the world's greatest riders will take part in the annual National championship and motorcycle classic to be held at the famous Altoona speedway on July 5th.

They will compete for a \$5000 purse that will carry with it not only the honor of winning, but the world's championships in this form of racing.

Eight events have been scheduled by the local promoters. Although the fifty mile race for the National championship is the feature, a one lap time trial open to all 61 cu. in. motors has been added which will establish the world's speedway track record.

This last event alone is expected to attract thousands of fans. Word has been received from as far south as North Carolina and from as far west as Indianapolis that large contingents will be on hand to witness the exhibition.

Other events will be a five mile amateur race, a five mile National championship race, a five mile Class B race, a ten mile National championship race, a twenty mile National championship race for 45 cu. in. motors and a twenty-five mile National championship race for 61 cu. in. motors.

All of them will be held on the mile and a quarter wooden bowl which is the world's fastest motorcycle track and if the races last year can be cited as an example speed ranging from 120 to 130 miles an hour can be expected.

The only chance of averting a head-on crash was to swerve which he did. Instead of turning to the right and into a ditch he pulled to the left where the flooded Bald Eagle was raging right under the embankment. Had they fallen into it probably every member of the party would have been drowned. As it happened one of the wheels of the car caught in the anchor of the railroad signal operating rods at the side of the track and held it suspended and teetering there until the party could get out.

The car was a Hartz sedan, so heavy that it could not be removed at the time so it was chained, front and back, to the railroad tracks and left dangling over the water until Tuesday morning.

RUNKLE.—James W. Runkle, who the past quarter of a century has owned and conducted the only hotel in Centre Hall, died last Thursday morning at 9:15 o'clock as the result of hardening of the arteries, kidney and heart trouble.

He was a son of Daniel and Susannah Grossman Runkle and was born on what is known as the Grossman farm, at Tusseyville, on August 16th, 1848, hence had reached the age of 77 years, 8 months and 24 days. His boyhood life was spent at Tusseyville but after he grew to manhood he engaged in farming on the Foster farm near Centre Hall where he lived eighteen years. Quitting the farm he moved to Middleburg, Snyder county, where for five years he lived a retired life then returned to Centre county and purchased the hotel at Centre Hall, which he conducted the past twenty-six years. He was a member of the Lutheran church and a good citizen.

On February 17th, 1868, he married Miss Rosetta Breon, at the home of her grand-parents in Georges valley Rev. G. M. Settemoyer, pastor of the Lutheran church at Centre Hall, officiating. She survives with one daughter, Miss Laura Runkle, at home. Another daughter, Mrs. J. A. G. Allison, passed away about two years ago. He also leaves one grand-son, Gross Allison, of New Castle, Ky., three brothers and a sister, namely: Sheriff John Runkle, of Middleburg; Calvin, of Shamokin; Daniel, of Penn Hall, and Mrs. Robert Musser, of Spring Mills.

Funeral services were held at his late home at 9:15 o'clock on Monday morning by his pastor, Rev. S. F. Greenhoe, and burial in the Centre Hall cemetery was in charge of the Lodge of Masons, of which he was a member.

MEESE.—Mrs. Lettie E. Meese, widow of the late John W. Meese, in his day one of the prominent merchants of Bellefonte, died at her home on Logan street at 11:30 o'clock on Tuesday morning. She had been a sufferer for some time with arterial trouble but was able to be up and around on Tuesday morning. After eating breakfast she went out on the porch, was taken violently ill and died within two hours.

She was a daughter of Austin and Anne Lucas and was born at Howard on September 2nd, 1844, hence was in her eighty-second year. She was the last of a family of twelve children. She married Mr. Meese in 1866 and all her married life had been spent in Bellefonte. In her early life she was a member of the Christian church but after coming to Bellefonte united with the Methodist church. Her husband had been dead for many years and her only survivors are one daughter, Mrs. J. Will Conley, and a grand-daughter, Mrs. William B. Wallis, who arrived here Tuesday from New Jersey.

Funeral services will be held at her late home at 2:30 o'clock this (Friday) afternoon by Rev. Homer C. Knox, burial to be made in the Union cemetery.

SLACK.—Mrs. Ann Eliza Slack, widow of the late John A. Slack, died at the home of William Sweeney, at Potters Mills, on Thursday of last week, following an illness of over two years as the result of an injury sustained in a fall.

She was a daughter of Henry and Catherine Miller and was born at Pleasant Gap on June 18th, 1854, hence was not quite 72 years of age. Thirty-three years ago she married Mr. Slack and all her married life had been spent in Potter township. She was a lifelong member of the Reformed church. Her husband died two years ago and her only survivors are one sister, Mrs. Sarah Jane Musser, of Bellefonte, and a brother, John A. Miller, of Warren.

Funeral services were held at the Sweeney home at 3:30 o'clock on Sunday afternoon, by Rev. Keener, of Centre Hall, after which the remains were transported to Bellefonte for burial in the Union cemetery.

KELLERMAN.—Mrs. Alma Sampell Kellerman, wife of Ray Kellerman, died at her home in Philadelphia, last Wednesday, following a prolonged illness with tuberculosis.

She was a daughter of Harry and Mattie Hunter Sampell and was born at Axe Mann on March 5th, 1893, hence was 28 years, 4 months and 5 days old. She is survived by her husband, who is in the contracting business in Philadelphia; her parents, two brothers and two sisters, as follows: Martha, at home; Edith, in the State of Indiana; Henry, of Mill Hall, and Blair, of Philadelphia. The remains were brought to Centre county and burial made at Pleasant Gap on Saturday.

HARM.—Clair E. Harm, of Snow Shoe, died at the Centre County hospital, last Thursday, following several months illness with acute Bright's disease. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. O. J. Harm and was born at Snow Shoe, being in his thirty-third year. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Maude Cecelia Harm, and three small children, Vincent, Oscar and Cecelia. He also leaves his parents, one sister and a brother, Marion and Walter Harm. The funeral was held on Saturday afternoon, burial being made in Askey's cemetery.

STERE.—Robert Irvin Stere, infant son of Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Stere, died at the family home in Altoona on Thursday evening of last week

as the result of an attack of pneumonia. In addition to the parents he is survived by two brothers and one sister, William, Hassell and Betty. The remains were taken to Milesburg where funeral services were held at the home of the child's grandmother, Mrs. Annie Baird, at eleven o'clock on Saturday morning, burial being made in the Milesburg cemetery.

HARTSOCK.—George Wesley Hartsock died at his home in Philipsburg, last Friday morning, as the result of heart trouble. He had not been feeling very good for a week but was able to be around as usual. On Friday morning he got up, ate his breakfast and shortly thereafter became violently ill, passing away at eight o'clock.

Deceased was a son of Huston and Eliza Hartsock and was born in Halfmoon valley on October 29th, 1861, hence was in his sixty-fifth year. As a young man he located in Philipsburg and for many years had been one of the most dependable employees in the Jones & Co. hardware store. He was a member and steward of the Trinity Methodist church and especially active in both church and Sunday school work. He was also a member of the Modern Woodmen of America and a good citizen in every way.

In 1886 he married Miss Ida Mary Beck, of Warriorsmark, who survives with one daughter, Mrs. George H. Holdren, of Philipsburg. He also leaves three grandsons, two brothers and a sister, J. O. Hartsock and Mrs. Miles Morrison, of Philipsburg, and John W. Hartsock, of Buffalo Run valley.

Funeral services were held at his late home at three o'clock on Sunday afternoon by Rev. S. B. Evans, burial being made in the Philipsburg cemetery.

Entire State Closed to Wild Turkeys and Hungarian Partridge.

The State Game Commission, last Friday, issued a ruling closing the entire State to the killing of wild turkeys and Hungarian partridge during the season of 1926, according to an announcement of Seth E. Gordon, secretary. This action was decided upon because hunters in many counties in the State had petitioned for closing of their own counties and the Commission did not look with favor upon closing some counties and thus permitting hunters to overrun neighboring counties with the result that the open sections would be almost entirely denuded of game and it would then be necessary to close those counties for several seasons in order to give the game a chance to recover from the unusual slaughter.

Under the Commission's ruling the ruffed grouse season and the bag limit is also reduced. Heretofore the season extended from November 1st to 30th and the limit for the season was fifteen birds. Under the new ruling the season will run from November 1st to 13th, inclusive, and the season limit will be ten birds.

The season for male ringneck pheasants is reduced from November 1 to 30, to November 1 to 13, while the season for rabbits and hares is reduced from November 1 to December 15 to November 1 to 30, Sundays excepted. All hunters will do well to make note of these changes.

Dave Lewis Won First Money in Altoona Auto Races.

Dave Lewis, the veteran California driver, in a Miller special, won first place and the \$10,000 purse in the big auto races at Altoona on Saturday. Lewis is forty-six years old and drove the 250 miles without a break in 2 hours, 13 minutes and 24 seconds. Norman Batten finished second and got \$5,000; John Duff third, \$2,500; fourth, Fred Comer, \$1,750; fifth, Eddie Hearne, \$1,300; sixth, Benny Hill, \$1,100; seventh, Frank Elliott, \$950; eighth, Pete de Paolo, \$850; ninth, Ralph Hepburn, \$800, and tenth, Ben Jones, \$750. Seven drivers who qualified but failed to complete the race got \$750 each, while extra prizes totalling \$2,200 were paid, making a grand total of \$32,450 paid in cash to the driving daredevils. Not an accident of any kind happened in the big bowl while the race was in progress, and it is estimated that fifty thousand people were present.

Poison the Cutworms.

A poison bait made of 20 pounds of bran, one pound of Paris green or white arsenic, and two quarts of cheap molasses is recommended for control of cutworms. Ask the county agent to mix and apply it.
