DON'T FAIL TO REGISTER

FOR KIDDIES PICNIC.

Stevens made an early trip down Bald Eagle valley and when he returned to Bellefonte the entire front of his car, lamps, radiator, hood and windshield were covered with thousands of mosquitoes and mosquitoe eggs. The insects were on the order of the New Jersey variety over half an inch in length, but fortunately they were all dead so that the breed will not molest Bellefonte residents. But the doctor certainly reduced the supply in Bald Eagle valley.
