STATE APPROPRIATION TO CENTRE CO. SCHOOLS.
The various school districts of Centre county have received vouchers from the State Treasurer for the last half of the State appropriation for the year ending July 1st. The total amount coming to the county is over \$7000 larger than the amount for the first half of the school year, Bellefonte receiving over one thousand dollars more. Seventeen districts in the county, in which schools have been closed, benefit to the extent of almost six thousand dollars. The net amount paid to each school district is as follows:
