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HOLT.—William Forsman Holt, for many years past a resident of Phillipsburg, died on Friday night, at Altamont Springs, Florida, where he and his wife were spending the winter. His death followed an operation.

He was a son of William and Mary Forsman Holt and was born in Snow Shoe township on December 14th, 1856, making his age 74 years, 2 months and 6 days.

He was a member of the Presbyterian church, a director of the First National bank, of Phillipsburg, and a Mason in high standing.

KANE.—Mrs. Margaret Kane, widow of James Kane, passed away at her home on Logan street, at 8:12 o'clock last Saturday morning, following an illness of some months with a complication of diseases.

She was a daughter of Patrick and Margaret Daugherty, both of whom came to this country from Ireland, and was born at Curtin on November 15th, 1859, hence had reached the age of 71 years, 3 months and 6 days.

HOSHOUR.—Rev. Edwin E. Hoshour, who forty years ago was pastor of the Bellefonte Lutheran church, died at the Warner hospital, in Gettysburg, on Saturday, following an illness of two months with complications, aged 67 years.

ROWLAND.—Mrs. Annie C. Rowland, widow of former Congressman Charles H. Rowland, of Phillipsburg, died last Thursday morning, following an illness of some months. She was 67 years old and leaves four children.

KRAMER.—Following seven week's illness with heart trouble Harry English Kramer, of south Spring street, passed away at the Centre County hospital at 11:25 o'clock on Wednesday night of last week.

He was a son of William and Annie Kramer and was born in Bellefonte on August 22nd, 1887, hence was 42 years, 6 months and 26 days old. His entire life was spent here.

On June 25th, 1910, he married Miss Annie Charlton, of Winburne, who survives with three children, Mrs. Elizabeth Markle, of Bellefonte, Sarah and Francis, at home.

FINK.—Mrs. Nancy A. Fink, widow of William E. Fink, died on Saturday morning, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Hannah Harrington, in Altoona, as the result of an attack of influenza.

She was a daughter of George and Lydia Carter Albright and was born near Altoona on June 11th, 1851, hence was in her 80th year.

BUBB.—Edward Bubb died at his home, at Colyer, last Thursday, following a brief illness, aged 75 years and five months. He was a native of Potter township, but lived at Pine Grove Mills for a number of years.

LUCAS.—William Henry Lucas, a native of Centre county, died at his home in Henderson township, Huntingdon county, on February 11, aged 76 years, 5 months and 29 days.

DOMESTIC RELATIONS, PLEAS OF GUILTY COURT.

Large Grist of Cases Disposed of by Judge Fleming.

Court convened last Thursday morning for domestic relations court and the following cases were called and disposed of: Commonwealth vs. Eveyn Fisher, prostitution. Defendant was committed to the house of the good Shepherd, at Reading.

Commonwealth vs. Willard Neff, charged with desertion and non-support. Prosecutrix, Mildred Neff. This case took considerable time and at the conclusion of the hearing the matter was held for disposition later.

Commonwealth vs. Harry H. Cramer, desertion and non-support. Prosecutrix, Mary A. Cramer. The defendant was ordered to pay the sum of \$15.00 per month and costs for the support of his two sons, Robert and Harold, and the other son, Edwin, was returned to father, who was required to give bond.

Commonwealth vs. Mark Grafmeyer, charged with desertion and non-support. Prosecutrix, Margaret Grafmeyer. The defendant was discharged upon the payment of costs. Commonwealth vs. Edward J. Friehofer, charged with the larceny of an automobile. Prosecutrix, A. L. Spotts. Defendant plead guilty and was remanded to jail for sentence at a future time.

Commonwealth vs. C. M. Cori, charged with issuing a bad check. Prosecutrix, George A. Beezer. The defendant plead guilty and sentence was deferred until the 31st day of March, the defendant in the meantime to make restitution and was released on his own recognizance.

Commonwealth vs. James Russell Wile. Prosecutrix, Leo Boden, county detective. The defendant, charged with running a gambling device, plead guilty and was sentenced to pay the costs of prosecution, a fine of \$100.00 and put on probation for a period of one year.

Commonwealth vs. James Russell Wile. Prosecutrix, Leo Boden, county detective. Charged with having in his possession intoxicating liquor. The defendant plead guilty and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$50.00, costs of prosecution and undergo probation for a period of one year.

Commonwealth vs. B. C. Crucetti, charged with violation of the liquor laws. Prosecutrix, Leo Boden. Defendant plead guilty and was sentenced to pay the costs of prosecution, a fine of \$100.00 and undergo probation for a period of three years.

Commonwealth vs. Mrs. Florence McKinley, charged with larceny. Prosecutrix, Thomas Harpster. Not a true bill.

Commonwealth vs. J. Donald Dunsmore, charged with assault and battery. Prosecutrix, Grace Ulrich. Defendant plead guilty and was sentenced to make restitution of \$31.75, pay the costs of prosecution and undergo probation for a period of one year.

Commonwealth vs. Harry Campbell, same as above.

Commonwealth vs. Harry Barnes, Prosecutrix, A. E. Yougel. Charged with violation of the liquor laws. The defendant plead guilty and was sentenced to pay the costs of prosecution, a fine of \$50.00 and undergo probation for a period of two years.

Commonwealth vs. C. M. Cori charged with issuing a bad check. Prosecutrix, A. C. Longee. Not prosed.

Commonwealth vs. Martin Dunlap, charged with malicious mischief. Prosecutrix, C. A. Beckwith. Not a true bill and county pay the costs.

Commonwealth vs. Alfred Mulhollen, indicted on three counts. First, breaking and entering; second, larceny, and third, receiving stolen goods and knowing the same to be stolen. Prosecutrix, William Vail. The defendant was charged with stealing meat out of the meat house of the prosecutrix. The verdict of the jury was guilty on the second and third counts, and the defendant was sentenced to pay the costs of prosecution and not less than one and a half nor more than three years in the Allegheny county work house.

Commonwealth vs. Samuel Cartwright. Prosecutrix, William Vail. The same facts and the same disposition as in the preceding case. Commonwealth vs. Charles Stover charged with assault and battery. Prosecutrix, Eva G. Simpson. Not a true bill and the prosecutrix to pay the costs.

Commonwealth vs. Lottie Fagan, accessory in receiving stolen goods. Prosecutrix William Vail. Not a true bill.

Commonwealth vs. Lottie Fagan, violation of the liquor laws. Prosecutrix, Leo Boden, county detective. The defendant plead guilty and was sentenced to pay the costs of prosecution, a fine of \$100.00 and not less than two nor more than four months in the Allegheny county work house.

Commonwealth vs. Robert Huggill, accessory in receiving stolen goods. Prosecutrix, William Vail. Not a true bill.

Commonwealth vs. Robert Huggill, violation of the liquor laws. Prosecutrix, Edward Gustafson. The defendant plead guilty and was sentenced to pay the costs of prosecution, a fine of \$100.00 and not less than three nor more than six months in the county jail.

Commonwealth vs. Ira Plubell, statutory charge. Prosecutrix, Mary Burfield. Verdict of the jury not guilty but to pay the costs.

Commonwealth vs. Edward Rhine. Prosecutrix, Leo Boden, county detective. Rendering aid in forging a check. The case was tried on Monday afternoon and Tuesday morning and at the close of the Commonwealth's testimony the court directed a verdict of not guilty.

Commonwealth vs. Ira Stere. Prosecutrix, G. W. Holt. Charged with larceny of a drum with some oil. This case was tried on Tuesday and a verdict of not guilty was rendered.

Commonwealth vs. R. H. Speicher, charged with larceny. Prosecutrix, John E. Beam. At the close of this case, on motion of counsel for defendant, the court directed a verdict of not guilty. The Hon. John A. Berkey, a former judge of Somerset county, was in court as counsel for the defendant in the above case.

Commonwealth vs. Elsie Taylor. Prosecutrix, P. C. Frank. Charged with aiding the escape of a prisoner in the hands of Mr. Frank.
