

ANDY RIDGE MAN FOUND DEAD IN HOME.

Mystery surrounds the death of C. Heverly, 56 years old, of Sandy Ridge, who was found dead in a stairs room of his home, where he died alone, on Monday evening of the week, by two neighbor women. The top of his head had been literally blown off by a rifle shot. The men made a search of the house when they failed to see Mr. Heverly and as usual, and after finding the body recalled that they had heard a gunshot the Saturday previous.

Coroner W. R. Heaton made an investigation on Tuesday of last week, and pronounced the man a suicide, deciding that an official inquest was unnecessary.

Later a bloody towel was found one of the first floor rooms of the use, and friends of the man insisted on a more thorough investigation. Consequently a coroner's inquest was held on Wednesday evening, and an investigation of five hours jury failed to agree on the manner of death. Four of the six men favored the suicide theory while the other two inclined to the theory that Heverly met his death as the result of an accidental discharge of his rifle in the cemetery, at Osceola Hills, last Wednesday afternoon.

TWO MORE MURDERERS ELECTROCUTED MONDAY.

Two more convicted murderers were put to death in the electric chair at Rockview on Monday morning. They were Sigismund "Big Joe" Szachewicz and John "Tex" Nafus, convicted of blowing up a pay car of the Glen Alden Coal company, near Warrior Run, Luzerne county, on the morning of January 13th, 1930, four men being killed in the explosion. "Big Joe," who weighed about 220 pounds, was the first man electrocuted and Nafus was taken to the chair shortly after. Both bodies were claimed and were taken back to Wilkes-Barre for burial.

HOSPITAL DRIVE TO DATE FAR SHORT OF LAST YEAR.

To date the annual drive for the Centre County hospital totals \$3160, which is less than half of the final total last year. Bellefonte, so far, has contributed \$1939, while State College has given \$1220.50, which is about 80 per cent more than last year, and there are still sixty fraternities to hear from. The same fraternities last year gave approximately \$200. The drive last year netted \$7214.63.
