

Washington, June 14.—The following order has just been issued: Headquarters, Pennsylvania Militia, Harrisburg, June 13.—General Order No. 40.—Whereas, information has been received from the War Department that the State will credit for all enlistments of colored men who may be mustered into the United States service as Pennsylvania troops, under the authority of the War Department, and that no credit can be allowed for individuals who leave the State, and are mustered into organizations elsewhere, it is ordered:—All persons are prohibited from raising colored volunteers in Pennsylvania, otherwise than under the authority of the War Department, or in Pennsylvania.
