

Gen. Sheridan's Success. New York, Aug. 14. The Commercial's Washington special says: There is positive and reliable information in the city to the effect that Gen. Sheridan has defeated Early in every encounter, and that the latter is retreating down the valley, closely pursued by our cavalry and infantry.

New York, Aug. 14. The Herald Harpers's Ferry correspondent of the 13th says:—Sheridan advanced by way of Charlestown and Berryville to Winchester. Our cavalry and some skirmishing with the enemy at various points between Berryville and Winchester. They came upon a party of some fifty rebels engaged in threshing grain, and surprised and captured the entire squad. Early was completely surprised by approach of our army, and made but slight resistance. He found his position flanked by Sheridan's manoeuvres and fell back during the night, leaving attempted an artillery duel this afternoon. Our latest information is to the effect that Sheridan passed through Winchester yesterday morning. No details of our losses received. Some fifteen or twenty killed and wounded. The latter are in the hospital at Berryville.

The REPULSE AT PETERSBURG.—The New York Post concludes an article thus:— At the same time, it remains to be said that Grant probably could not have gained the information concerning the nature of the enemy's works which he needed in any other way than by an assault. What we have endeavored to make plain to the reader is, that the failure of an assault on works of the strength of those at Petersburg is not an uncommon incident in a siege that is not decisive against Grant at all; that he maintains over the enemy the same moral and physical superiority that he acquired over them at Spotsylvania Court House; and that as Lee has never since that day dared to assume the offensive against Grant, so he is in no better position to do this now than he was before the assault.

The Petersburg Disaster. Washington, August 12.—The National Republican of this evening says that General Burdette appeared before the Military Commission in session at City Point on Wednesday, and gave a statement of the circumstances connected with the recent assault upon Petersburg.

General Burdette insists that the orders given him were carried out faithfully, and that neither himself nor the officers of his corps are responsible for the failure.

The first two articles of the Constitution, adopted by the Constitutional Convention of Louisiana, are to be submitted to the people, are as follows:—

Art. 1. Slavery and involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime, whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, are hereby forever abolished and prohibited throughout the State.

Art. 2. The Legislature shall make no law recognizing the right of property in man.

The "Cops" are making a great fuss about the size of the McClellan meeting held in New York city. We don't see that it is much to blow about. It was a big meeting. It will be remembered that the traitor Breckenridge had a majority of forty thousand in New York city at the last Presidential election, and no one doubts but what Jeff. Davis would receive more votes in New York city than a nest of snipers, and not much to brag on, and to McClellan no good.

The Chicago Post (Democrat) thinks the indications are daily growing that Millard Fillmore will be the nominee of the National Democratic Convention for President. Judge Nelson is understood to be the favorite of the Albany Regency, and McClellan has the most serious strength.

DESPAIR OF THE SOUTH. CHARLESTON.—One of the national papers has released from confinement in Charleston city reports that no one can imagine how utterly used up and hope less the rebellion is, why they no longer, as he has done some months in its very cradle. The sufferings of the people are beyond belief, and whatever their northern sympathizers may think or pretend to think, they themselves are in the lowest abyss of despair, and utterly infuriated against the Richmond tyranny under which they groan. They are in want of the necessities of life, and there is not an able-bodied man or boy in all South Carolina who has not been ruthlessly conscripted.
