Letter from the Army.
[The following letter we received through the Hon. Dr. Lawrence, which, as he says, "shows something of the temper of the soldiers now in the army"]

1st Dr. 2nd Army Corps,
Near Petersburg, Nov. 11th, 1864.
Dear S.—As I am alone this evening, I felt as though I should pay my debt to you. I have nothing that will be particularly interesting to you at this time. We are all anxious to hear the election news. Rumor gives us favorable reports, and we confidently expect a grand success of the Union ticket, which will place "Father Abraham" in the White House for another four years. The soldiers have shown their loyalty by giving a large majority for Lincoln. All the old soldiers voted right, while the recruits and bounty jumpers were in the majority for "Mac." However, we have shown copperheads and traitors at home, upon what ground we stand, and what kind of a peace we desire. Poor "Little Mac" what regrets will fill his bosom as he looks back on his former popularity with the soldiers, and with what reluctant steps he will turn away from the White House toward the head-waters of "Salt River," where he will mourn the sad fate of his hopes and the dimmed lustre of his "two stars."

Hancock has left us; and what soldier is not sorry? I have a song on the subject, composed by Lawrence Reynolds, Sergeant 63d N. Y. V. [The song spoken of here, was published in the Argus week before last—Editor.] It is pretty good. It is reported that Hancock takes command of the "Army of the James." Gen. Humphreys is his successor.

The election passed off quietly to the surprise of all. I think one reason of this was that the New York soldiers had all voted "proxy" long ago, and their votes had gone to that State. The "rebs" no doubt knew this; hence the quiet. The vote of the 14th stands—Lincoln 148, McClellan 55. We have good weather here, tho' to-day threatens rain. The air is cold and damp.
