We publish this week the Receipts and Expenditures of the County for the year 1864. This excludes part of the reading matter prepared for this issue but we know our readers are more interested in knowing what becomes of the money of the county, and it, what way the taxes are applied.

Donation.—Rev. Knox, pastor of the M. E. Church, Bridgewater, was the recipient of a handsome Donation last week, by his congregation, amounting to near two hundred dollars.

Quotas Assigned.—The quotas for several districts throughout the State, under the act for three hundred thousand men, have been assigned. In the 24th district, the assignment is 1,641.

Prof. Bosler has been engaged at the Beaver Female Seminary (Mr. Mercer's) to teach vocal and instrumental music. The number of music scholars has increased so largely that the music teacher, Miss McGinnis, was compelled to seek assistance, and hence the employment of Prof. Bosler.

It provides for the disfranchisement of any persons who, having been drafted or subject to the draft, or who have deserted or may desert, may have fled from their homes or concealed themselves to avoid military service.
