Smith's Ferry Oil Refinery
To the Editor of the Pittsburgh Courier:—Selling something of every issue of your paper, of certain localities, covers of oil, ask space in which the unquenchable thirst of the Ferry region. The refinery commenced here in 1850, and has been in operation ever since, producing out of the southern oil, the results were very satisfactory. The results were very satisfactory. It is amid the smoke and ravages of war, the enterprise of our people has been preserved and improved, surely the writings of rebellion in its death throes will not check its advance. The bustle and activity, and dexterity to be seen here attest that such is the feeling common among citizens. On Smith's Ferry Run, which empties into the Ohio at Smith's Ferry, some nine wells have been sunk to the proper depth, with the most flattering success, there being not a single failure. The yield of these wells is from one to five barrels daily, and most of them being flowing wells the expense attending the securing of the oil is very trifling. Those requiring the aid of pumps are attended to in less than a week.

About the same number of wells are to be found in the village of Glasgow, which is a short distance from Smith's Ferry, on the right bank of the Ohio, and on the left bank of the Little Beaver Creek, which puts into the Ohio at this point. Turning up this creek we find its banks dotted with derricks for a distance of more than five miles from its mouth. Three miles up this creek, where a few years ago nothing met the eye of the traveler save frowning hills, and an occasional unfriendly looking hut; where emigrants had made footprints, and the land of sojourners fewer improvements, are several wells of great value. The first well was bored about three years ago, and has been yielding two barrels a day ever since. The second well was bored fourteen months ago, and has given an average of five barrels per day. A third well has been in operation six months, giving a yield of ten barrels a day. For this well its owners have refused fifty thousand dollars.

The expense incurred in putting a well down to the required depth is small—the total cost being perhaps four thousand dollars. This absolute loss in case of failure, which is not counted on, would be about two thousand dollars; and the engine and tools can be sold for as much as they cost as long as the demands are made on the supply. These wells are usually cased every four or six weeks, the expense accompanying which is less than five or ten dollars.

The Cairo City Oil Company have struck a vein of oil and gas four miles from the mouth of the creek, at a depth of 585 feet. Competent judges pronounce it an excellent well. The Cairo City Oil Company are down more than 400 feet with cheering prospects for oil.

In a distance of five miles from the mouth of the creek—where we once traced to melancholy and moody, and solemn silence, the meandering of a narrow, grass grown road, with no sounds falling on the ear but the rippling of the silvery current dancing over its rock bound channel, as if eager to mingle with more company—ample preparations have been made for boring seventy-five or a hundred wells, which will fully develop this region. The land on this creek is about all leased or sold. Two farms on the Little Beaver, one of fifty acres, and the others of forty five acres, have been sold to Pittsburgh companies for twenty five thousand dollars each.

The oil obtained here is amber colored, and used for burning in the crude state. It is used entirely in this state in this neighborhood. The fact of its being always used here, free from all accidents, ought to be enough to dispel fears wherever felt, with respect to its safety. It is used extensively as a lubricating oil, and in many woolen factories for greasing wool. The Smith's Ferry oil wells for as much with packages returned, as Allegheny oil is worth packages included.
