TRANSFERRED.—Dr. J. C. Lewis, Post Surgeon at Pittsburg, has been transferred from the Military Hospital in that city, to Camp Reynolds, at which place a large number of Western Pennsylvania troops will be concentrated for muster and discharge.

The third series, now being sold, is the last authorized by Congress, after it is taken the Secretary of the Treasury will have exhausted his authority to borrow and the expenses of the Government will be so reduced that the necessity for borrowing will cease. It is not probable that another loan will be offered within the next half century at a rate of interest higher than four or five per cent, and our readers who have funds at hand would do well to take advantage of the opportunity now afforded them for a safe and profitable investment. The notes are being taken up at the rate of a million and a half per day and will soon be exhausted.

Commissioners Beighly and Barnes have purchased the right of the County for Clay's Patent Metallic Weather-strip, which we noticed last week. Soldiers' Festival

"Our boys are coming home" at last. Their good fight has been fought out triumphantly, and they return lay aside the musket and mingle again with their fellow-citizens in the pursuits of civil life. The blue jackets and storm-beaten faces of the fighting 130th, are already amongst us, the men enlisted last year for the one year service are on the way, and the veterans we have scattered amongst many of the old organizations will soon follow.

These men have long stood as a protecting wall between us and utter ruin, and now that their work is done, and they have secured by their blood and toil to us and our posterity the heritage of constitutional freedom transmitted by our fathers, it is but proper that we should testify publicly our appreciation of their services, and our regard for the memory of their comrades who have fallen in our behalf before the pestilence or in the shock of battle.

A meeting is called at the Court House for this evening to arrange the preliminaries for a Festival in their honor, to be held on the Fourth of July, at some central point, and to be participated in by the people of the entire county. We trust that a thorough organization will be effected, embracing every borough and township, and that our people will contribute liberally of their time and means to make the demonstration worthy of its occasion. Beaver county has given her best blood to the cause, and her soldiers have borne even more than their share of the labors and losses of war. Let us meet together with one accord, on the next Anniversary of our Independence, to render a fitting tribute to those who have been returned to us, and to wear a lasting garland of affection and honor for the departed brave.

The particulars of the accident which occurred upon the Cleveland & Pittsburg Railroad, below Vanport last week, as reliably reported to us, are such as demand the attention of our District Attorney and Grand Jury. It seems that two freight trains were under way for Pittsburg, within a short distance of each other, and that the train in advance finding the track obstructed by the gravel train was stopped, but that the conductor neglected to flag the train behind.

The condition of the track was concealed from the engineer of the hindmost train by an intervening car, and the consequence was that the speed, and the result was the accident.

It is due to the traveling public, where lives are in the hands of these railroad employees, that they should be held to a strict accountability, and we trust that this case will be investigated, and if the conductor or the first freight train is found to have been guilty of the criminal carelessness with which he is charged, that he will be properly punished.
