A SWINDLE.—A fellow called at a store, in Pottstown, says the Harrisburg Telegraph, a few days ago, and purchased goods to the amount of \$2, and representing himself as short of change, presented a \$100 U. S. Compound Interest Note in payment. The merchant took the bill, returned the change, and the purchaser left. A few days after the bill was discovered to be counterfeit—one so well executed as to lead to the belief that it was printed on one of the genuine plates. The face of the note was perfect, but the back was printed with ink somewhat paler than the bright green on the good notes. The dodge practiced by this fellow is a common one among swindlers, and business men should keep a look out for similar attempts.

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Court Proceedings.—The whole time of the Court last week, until Friday afternoon, was taken up with Commonwealth cases. The first case was...

Com. vs. Frank Cokonor and Lewis Marker, indicted for Rape, had not guilty. This was a peculiar case. The defendants were aged respectively eleven and sixteen years, the prosecutrix nine years.

Same vs. Mary Partington and Sarah Parrington. Indicted for Assault and Battery upon Mary N. and Mary J. Gallagher. Verdict, guilty in both cases. Defendants being called, and not answering, recognizance forfeited.

Same vs. Mary N. Gallagher. Defendant discharged on verdict of jury. Plea on abatement.

Same vs. Charles Tea and Richard Tea. Indicted for Assault and Battery. Same vs. Daniel McKee. Indicted for same. Cross-examined, tried together. Verdict, guilty as to the Teas, not guilty as to McKee, and the Teas to pay the costs.

Same vs. Murford. Indicted for Larceny—stealing horse and buggy. Defendant not appearing, his recognizance was forfeited, and the amount (\$300) paid into Court and distributed.

Same vs. Benjamin James. Indicted for selling liquor contrary to law. Defendant, pleaded guilty, and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$10 and costs of prosecution.

The application for new trial in the case of Alfred Campbell vs. Rebecca Campbell's Adm'r. argued some time since, was refused.

Ed. B. Martin, convicted the first week of Court for seduction, etc., not appearing for sentence, his recognizance was forfeited.
