CONNECTICUT ELECTION.

Grand Republican Victory—Gen. Geary's Majority about 1,000—Legislature Two to One.

The hardest political contest that was ever fought in the State of Connecticut, was decided on Monday in favor of the Republican party.

The following is the latest dispatch: HARTFORD, April 3, 2.30, a. m. Returns from all but ten towns give Hawley 700 majority.
