RECONSTRUCTION.

A Washington special dispatch to the Pittsburg Commercial, dated Washington, April 28th, says the Reconstruction Committee held a very important meeting to-day...

Article - Section 1. No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States...

Sec. 2. Representatives shall be appointed among the several States which may be included within this Union, according to their respective numbers...

Sec. 3. Until the 4th day of July, 1870, all persons who voluntarily adhered to the late insurrection, giving aid and comfort...

Sec. 4. Neither the United States nor any State shall assume to pay any debt or obligation already incurred, or which may hereafter be incurred...

Sec. 5. The Congress shall have power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article. A bill to provide for the restoration of the States lately in rebellion...

First. The President and Vice President of the Confederate States, so called, and the heads of Departments thereof.

Second. Those who in other countries acted as agents of the Confederate States.

Third. Those who in the military or naval academy of the United States, Judges of the courts of the U. States, and members of either house of the 36th Congress of the United States, who gave aid or comfort to the late rebellion.

CONGRESS.

APRIL 24.—A bill to increase the clerical force of the Department of the Interior was referred to a Special Committee. Bills were reported making Consular and Diplomatic appointments; authorizing the coinage of five-cent pieces; and to supply deficiencies in the Printing Appropriations...

The bill for a ship Canal around Niagara Falls was debated, and a substitute offered to charter a company to construct the canal. The bill went over till to-day.
