

AN IMPOSTER.—The South American Major-General (!) Coolbaugh, of whom we spoke a couple of weeks ago as being temporarily at Phillipsburg, this county, turns out to be an imposter. Although dressed in military costume, and carrying papers with him to show that he had been, and was, what we represented him, before, it now appears that he has neither been in our own service, nor in any way connected with the South American army. His papers were therefore forgeries. The part he played in this vicinity, however, paid him somewhat, but not, we presume, as much as he expected, on account of the premature exposure of his swindling character. He and his lady left Phillipsburg last week in hot haste, but not before they had contracted a heavy boarding bill in that place, amounting to \$150 or \$200, and a livery bill in Rochester, amounting to some \$60 or \$80 more—both of which were left unpaid. An exchange paper says that this same "General" Coolbaugh recently "did" the Courtland Hotel, in New York, out of a "stiff boarding bill." At that time he was a "General" in the Mexican service. He is said now to be a native of Monroe county, and is an ardent political talker of the Hiester Clymer persuasion. He is boisterously hostile to "Sambo," and misses no opportunity in kicking and cuffing that harmless individual to his heart's content.

A CHIVALROUS COPPERHEAD.—At the Clymer meeting, on Friday last, a middle-aged lady of the copper persuasion, made herself very demonstrative at every remark made concerning the negro, by the would-be Governor. She directed her remarks particularly to two genteel, well-dressed and intelligent looking ladies, who happened to be standing near her. The ladies listened to her offensive remarks quite patiently for some time without replying; but as she persisted in addressing them they mildly began to answer her, and in turn brought some very perplexing questions to her consideration. JUDICIAL CONFERENCE, 27th DISTRICT. NATIONAL HOTEL, BEAVER, July 2, 1866.

Pursuant to notice, the Conference appointed by the Republican Convention of Washington and Beaver counties, not constituting the 27th Judicial District of Penna., met to the nomination of a candidate for the office of President Judge of said District. John H. Ewing, William McKinnon, and William McDaniel, Esqs., representing Washington county, Dr. M. Lawrence, Benj. Wilde, and H. Hice, Esqs., representing Beaver county.

The conference was organized by electing John H. Ewing, Esq., Chairman, and appointing H. Hice Esq., Secretary. Mr. Wilde, on behalf of Beaver county, then presented the name of Hon. B. B. Chamberlin, and Mr. McDaniel, on behalf of Washington county, that of A. W. Acheson, Esq., candidates. A ballot being had, resulted in three votes for Mr. Chamberlin, and three for Mr. Acheson.

THE CONFERENCE THEN ADJOURNED, to meet at the Monongahela House, Pittsburgh, on the 2d of July, at which time and place the conference again assembled—all members being present. Ballotings were again had, resulting as before, in three votes for Mr. Chamberlin, and three for Mr. Acheson. Being unable to agree, on motion adjourned to meet at the call of the Chairman.

CONFERENCE AGAIN MET PURSUANT TO call of the Chairman, all members present. On motion, proceeded to another ballot for candidate, with the same result as on previous occasions. A motion to adjourn sine die being then made, some informal discussion grew up, pending which the motion to adjourn was withdrawn, and it was then on motion resolved that the conference do now adjourn, being unable to make a nomination, that they report their action to their respective County Committees, and ask further advice and instruction, and that they again meet at the call of the Chairman.

CONFERENCE AGAIN MET PURSUANT TO call of Chairman. All members present except Dr. Lawrence, who reported his inability to attend on account of sickness in his family. Mr. Wilde informed the conference that he was instructed to withdraw the name of Hon. B. B. Chamberlin as a candidate, which he did; and declining to act further with the conference, himself withdrew. There then being but one member present from Beaver county, on motion adjourned to meet at Franklin Springs, on Saturday, Sept. 1st, 1866; when and where the conference again assembled. Dr. M. Kinnon being unable to attend, Dr. S. Wilson, Esq., was authorized to appear and act in his stead, and on motion admitted to a seat in the conference. After some discussion another ballot was had, which resulted in the nomination of A. W. Acheson, Esq., as President Judge of the 27th Judicial District. On motion, adjourned.
