Accident on the C. and P. R. - A freight train going north on the Cleveland and Pittsburgh Railroad, was thrown off the track on Tuesday afternoon, near Bridgeport Ohio, by some wheelbarrow, smashing up the locomotive, and derailing the passenger trains. The engine turned over on its side and the engineer, Frank Robinson, a resident of Manchester, this county, in jumping from it, was severely crushed. He was brought to his home at Manchester, and Dr. McCook and Umbastetter, the local physicians in this city, summoned yesterday, who attended to his injuries. The cause of the accident was as follows: Workmen were repairing the track and had a rail out of the regular station at that point, failed to give the signal to the approaching train, and the engine was stopped in time to avoid the accident. - Pitts.
