To Take the Sense of the People of Beavey County, apon the Question of a Prohibitary Liquor Law.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Senste and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same.
