J. R. DUNLAP, Esq., one of the editors of the State Gazette, and who has hitherto acted as Gov. Grant's private Secretary, resigned the latter position a few days ago, and succeeded by Dr. Gibson, of Philadelphia.

William Messer, the editor and publisher of the Philadelphia Sunday Mercury, convicted of a gross libel on District Attorney William B. Grant, was sentenced a few days ago to pay a fine of five hundred dollars, and undergo imprisonment in the county jail for a period of nine months.

We reluctantly yield compliance to the demands of this week to matters pertaining to the Odell libel suit. Our obligations to doing so were overcome by the fact that the defendant in the case and his party friends have so distorted the circumstances so as to enlighten the public mind.

A very large political fight is now raging for the United States Senatorship in Ohio, between Judge Thurman and C. L. Vallandigham, and their respective friends.
