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THE PREEDMEN.

I would respectfully call your atten-tion to the recommendations of the Sec-retary of the Interior, for uniting the du-ties of supervising the education of freed-men with the other duties devolving on the Commissions of Education. THE CENSUS.

If it is the desire of Congress to make the census, which must be taken during the year 1870, more complete and perfect than haretofore, I would suggest early action upon any plan that may be agreed upon. As Congress, at the last session, appointed a Committe to take into consideration such measures as might be deemed proper in reference to the census and to report a plan, I desist from saying more.

AORICULTURAL. I recommend to your favorable consideration the claims of the Agricultural Bureau for a liberal appropriation. In a country softwestick in climate and soil as ours, and with a population so largely dependent up of agriculture, the benefits that can be conferred by properly fostering the Bureau are incalculable.

PAY OF PUBLIC SERVANTS desire respectfully to call the atten-n of Congress to the inadequate sala-ss of a number of important officers a Government. In this message I will not enumerate them, but will specify the Justices of the Supreme Court. No cliange has been mude in their sularies for fifteen years. Within that time the labors of the Court have been largely increased, and the expenses of living have it least doubtied. Buring the same time, Congress has swice found it necessary to increase largely the conspensation of its own members, and the duty which it owes to another Department of the Government deserves, and will andoubtedly receive its due consideration. ot enumerate them, but will specify the

General Sherman advises the adoption by Congress of the new army regulations as prepared by the Special Board of officers.

In referring to the army consolidation he says there are five hundred and nine unattached officers, of whom one hundred and fifty six are awaiting orders.—The number of retired officers is one hundred and seventy seven. He urges that cavalry and artillery regiments be officered alike in regimental and company organizations, and asks for an extra Lieutenant for cavalry companies. He urges that it is unjust that the reduction of the army should fall exclusively upon the infantry arm of the service, and recommends that after Congress has enacted the necessary laws, the President assemble a board of disinterested general officers to whom shall be committed the whole matter of reduction and reorganization.

Gon. Sherman comments upon what he Gon, Sherman comments upon what he called the absurdity of the Staff of Army making their own reports to the Secretary of War. If this be continued, he says, we have the absurdity of the Gen. commanding the army with his chief commanding the army with his chief staff officers reporting to somebody else. He hopes for legislation that will allow officers of the army to call upon the Gen. for troops, instead of the President. Headvocates an increase of pay for the soldiers. He recommends that forts covering the cities of Portland, Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore, New Orleans, and San Francisco, be completed as soon as possible.

Reconnoissances and geographical and geological explorations and surveys have been continued during the year in the territory west of the Mississippi river, and information thus obtained is supplied to the trops occupying that section of country. SPIRITS.—In considering the increase of rovenue from distilled spirits for the last six months of the fiscal year ending June 30th, 1869, the subjoined factshould be remembered. There were in the bonded warehouses on the 1str of July, 1868, as shown by the accounts kept in this office, 27,278,420 gallons of spirits. This included all claims for leakage then outstanding, and a large quantishould be aboushed at once. Only \$175,785 of the amount expended by the Government for this purpose had been repaid on the 30th of June 1809.


