The report of Judge Orth, Chairman of the Sub-Committee of Foreign Affairs, regarding the Panamanian investigation, is unimportant to severally condemn Admirals Gordon and Davis and to sustain ex-Minister Washburn. The report has been submitted to the Sub-Committee, which meets again on Tuesday night.

CONCURRENT resolutions have been introduced in the Lower House of the Kansas Legislature asking Senators Ross and Pomeroy and Representative Clark to resign, as their influence had been impaired by circumstances growing out of the late and lavish expenditures on the part of one of them. The resolutions were referred to special committees.

General O'Neill, President of the Fenian Brotherhood, has issued a call for a general congress of the organization to meet in New York, on Tuesday, April 19th, for the purpose of discussing final preparations for active hostilities. Invitation is extended to all Irish national organizations, including that of which John Savage is the head, to send representatives.

PRINCE ARTHUR arrived in Washington City at half past five o'clock on Saturday afternoon. Quite a crowd congregated at the depot, but no opportunity was given for a demonstration. The party entered carriages and drove immediately to the residence of the British Ambassador where on that night the Prince received members of the British Legation.

Trial of Bohner and Vandenberg, murderers of the Peight family at Huntington, resulted in a verdict of murder in the first degree on Friday last. They were both sentenced to death. On being asked if they had anything to say why sentence should not be passed upon them, Bohner was silent, but Vandenberg replied that he was not guilty and knew nothing of the murder until he was arrested in Altoona.

THE Tribune of Friday morning, publishes the action of Iowa and Ohio in ratifying the Fifteenth Amendment, and says: "Now let George speak, let us see how much longer the advocates of re-vengeful delay in Congress can withhold the admission of Virginia Representatives and Senators, which alone is needed to give validity to the Amendment, and make the Fifteenth Amendment a part of the fundamental law of the land."

A CELEBRATED photographer of Copenhagen lately surprised the directors of the National Bank of Berlin by presenting to them a packet of notes made by himself, which exactly resembled the current paper money of the realm. That none of the officials could distinguish them, astonished, and anything but pleased with the discovery, the authorities of the bank requested him to invent some form of paper money which could not be thus imitated. He has done his best, but his success is very doubtful.

THE Commissioners of the District of Columbia, in their session on the 21st of January last, received and heard a delegation from the Woman's Suffrage Convention. The delegation was nearly two hundred in number, nearly all ladies. The Commissioners were addressed by Mrs. Stanton, Mrs. Hooker, Miss Anthony and several others. The last named speaker said if only one woman, or no woman, in the District desired to vote, they should have thought to do so, if their protection made the exercise of the ballot necessary. The Commissioners listened attentively to the speakers, but gave no indication of a disposition to grant their request.

THE resignation of the Red River leaders by the Hudson Bay Company as the only legitimate Government in Winnipeg has excited much conversation in Washington city. No force will be attempted against the insurgents, but profuse promises of transcendent railroad are made. To enhance the rapid course of events toward annexation to the United States, it is announced that a bill will be passed at the February session of the Dominion Parliament, and that Great Britain may be induced to guarantee five per cent. dividends on the stock. Minnesota are urging a land grant from Breckenridge on Red River termination of the St. Paul & Pacific Railroad, to the Winnipeg border, with assurance of its immediate construction, as a sure means to check the Canadian scheme.
