A Novel Way of Fattening

Grese .- The New Castle Gazette and Democrat of last week says: David Winternitz exhibited two dressed goese in our office last week which, for fat beat everything we have seen this season. They weighed 17 pounds apiece, and by measurement the fat was three fourths of an inch thick on the back, and two inches thick on the breast. His method of fattening them was given as follows: He penned them up, not alowing them freedom except for a shor time occasionally in the water. A bag or poke with shelled corn was hung up, which had a hole in the bottom of it large enough for two or three grains of this he kept within reach of the geese all the time.
