

unmercifully flogged by two men, keeping time with their whips, the blood flowing at every blow, when in a short time the deck was covered with blood. As each Chinaman was flogged he was washed with salt and water and sent below.

We arrived at Angar, Batavia, September 9, remained there two days, proceed ing thence to Mauratius, where we took on water and coal, the ship remaining in quarantine. From Mauritius we went to the Cape of Good Hope. In all these ports the coolies were kept below, and while coaling was going on the hatches were put on and the hospitals for the sick kept closed. The heat was intolerable even in the open air. The voyage of the poor coolies was one of unimaginable suf fering. They were flogged, kicked, cuffed and throughout treated with the greatest cruelty. The filth and stench were something horrible. The hospitals were not cleansed during the whole voyage. I venture to say that in the annals of the African slave trade all the horrors of the "inside passage" never surpassed these of this Chinese slave ship. The deaths on this murderous voyage reached eighty, or eighty per cent of the number taken on board at Macao. The deaths doubtless were caused by the floggings and the horrible filthy condition of the ship. We reached Havana December 1. We were not put into quarantine, but proceeded at once to discharge our cargo of live freight.

The vessel is to all intents and purpo ses German property. She has been chartered to the Havana Chinese Importing Company for two trips, one of which is now fulfilled. There was on board an individual styled, in sailor parlance, a "paper captain." He appeared to be the agent of the owners of the coolies, or something like a supercargo. He had con trol of the coolies-superintended the flogging and other punishment inflicted on the coolies throughout the voyage. A more merciless scoundrel never raised a lash.

The other captain is a German. In the ship's papers he is styled sailing master. The first, second and third niates are Germans. The carpenter is a German, the chief engineer is American, and the others are English and Scotch. The crew was composed of several nations, but all of them understanding English. There were but two or three beside the "paper captain" who spoke Spanish. The languages used on board among officers and crew were English and German, and for commanding the ship English was used exclu-

-Rev. Frederick March, a Congregational minis. ter, of Hartford Conn., died in that city Friday, at the advanced age of 90 years.

-Friday, being the anniversary of the death of Archbishop Spand ling, a grand messe solonnelle was celebrated in the Baltimore Cathedral.

-Congressmen are to receive \$8,000 per-annum hereafter, according to the bill just reported to the House of Representatives by the Judiciary Committee.

-The Arkansas Senate has passed a Civil Rights bill attaching heavy penalties to hotel keepers and railway companies, &c., for denying any privileges to colored people.

-A rumor was prevalent in Great Salt Lake City Friday night that President Grant had ordered a heavy force of regular troops to Utah, and the Mormons are greatly excited thereat.

-Four business houses in Brookfield, Missouri, were burned Sunday night. Loss, \$30,010; insurance small. Mrs. McCartney, a milliner and one of the sufferers, was arrested on suspicion of having fired the buildings.

-Laura D. Fair lectured in Sacramento, California; on Thursday night. She denied that she at tacked the press, but said that the clergy generally are the only individuals who persecute her. The audience was smail.

-"Old Joe Pentland," the famous circus clown died in New York Friday. He was born in Boston, and made his first appearance in the arena at Niblo's many years ago. Recently his mind has been impaired and he has not appeared in public.

-The Pomeroy Investigating Committee held a ecret session at Topeka Kansas, Friday, taking the testimony of Senator York.

-The Texas and Pacific rairoad engineers have commenced locating a line of road through San Diego City, California

-Subscriptions to the \$20,000.000, loan began at Havana on Thursday. It is reported that the chances of the loan being taken up are favorable.

-The preliminary report of the Senate Privileges and Elections Committee on the Louisiana investigation will relate exclusively to the legality of the electoral vote.

-The Boston Common Council has passed an order to open the public library on Sunday by a vote of 47 to 10 nays, and the order will be carried in to effect next Sunday .

-A generous citizen of Toledo has bequeathed one hundred and sixty acres of valuable land, near the city, for the foundation of an institution to which both sexes are to be admitted and taught in the arts, trades and related sciences. The course will be free to those unable to pay.
