GENERAL NEWS.

-West Liberty, Muscatine county, Iows, with a population of about 2,000, has not a single dram shop or liquor saloon, and has not had since it was incorporated.

-A narrow gagne railroad is projected between this road, and purpose, to take the most of the stock, and to own and control the road.

-The most remarkable chime of bells in this country is on the chapel of Notre Dame University near South Bend, Ind. It consists of twenty-four, belis, the largest weighing 14,000, pounds, ranging through two octaves. It may be heard in its deep reverberations for twenty miles away.

-The Maine Editor and Publishers Association have passed resolutions against the proposed action of Congress requiring the prepayment of postage on newspapers at the office of publication. -The Maine prohibitory liquor law bill will be

amended so as not to include cider.

-Texas, by the census of 1870, has 850,000 peo-

ple. The State is rapidly developing. -The New York Times is evidently very much disgusted with the condition of housekeeping in that city. At least it says: "The statement that housekeeping has become, for most people, intolerably expensive and difficult, is one which almost universal experience and observation will confi.m. House rent is high; houses are inconvenient in arrangement and construction; food, as generally cooked, is costly and not remarkably healthful or attractive; servants are not readily procured, cannot be retained long, and are wasteful, unskillful, and egligent to a very annoying extent. Of course this is not a statement without exceptions, which we are not only too happy to recognize. But the exceptions are few and far between."

-The Lower House of the Kansas Legislature has passed a concurrent resolution, asking Congress not to open the Indian Territory to settlement until all the laws allowing land grants to railroads n the Territory are repealed.

-A Washington special says: The Spanish M n ister, Polo, says that it does not seem to him that Spain will retrogade to despotism, and that a change in the Government will not affect the status of Cuba He considers Amadeus honest and liberal. At the Senate Department it is doubted if success will follow in case Rivero is to be the first President, although his qualificatons are conceded.

-At a meeting of the Chairmen of the Trades Occupations of the Centennial 'Annaversary In Philadelphia a report of the subscriptions to the stock was read, which showed large receipts. A letter was read from J. Edgar Thomson announcing that the Railroad Committee would raise at least \$500,090. A grand mass meeting will be held on Washington's birthday in aid of the cause.

-The Pittsburgh Chronicle of the 14th says: The Women Suffrage Association of this city must be in good standing in the Methodist church. On last Friday evening Bishop Simpson, the leading Bishop of the denomination, by invitation of the President of the Pittsburgh Women Suffrage Association, adressed the Constitutional Convention on women suffrage, and W. A. Davidson, D. D. will lecture this evening before the Suffrage Asso ciation on "Three Things Woman Must Have." The Association meets at 68 and 70 Fifth avenue Maltby building.

-A resolution has been introduced in the Massachusetts Legislature applauding the action of Spain in becoming a Republic.

-Ray's steam tannery at Tyione Pa., was burned Thursday morning of last week. The loss will amount to sixty thousand dollars.

-On Tuesday of last week the books for subscriptions at London to the Japanese \$10,000,000 loan, after being open only three days, were closed and it was found that \$50,000,000 had been subscribed, and the bonds were almost immediately after quoted at three and a half premium. -- The Eric officials say the laying of the third rail will commence in the spring, and it is proba-


