WHEREAS, by an Act passed by the Legislature of this Commonwealth, it is made the duty of the sheriff of every county to give notice of an elec-tion to be held at the time and places of holding election for township and municipal officers of said election districts, for the purpose of voting for or against the Act know as the Local Option Law approved the 27th day of March, A. D. 1872, which provides as follows:

SEC. 1. Be it enacted, &c., That on the third Friday of March, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, in every city and county of this Oommonwealth and at the annual municipal elec-tions every third year thereafter. in every such city and county, it shall be the duty of the inspectors and judges of the election in the cities must feel certain an order for 25 bound in cloth and countles, to receive tickets, either written or will follow." -Frank Leslie. counties, labelled on the outside "license." and recommended, and can vouch for their value and | on the inside "for license," or "against license," the excellence of the "Harrison" brand of white and to deposit said fickets in a box provided for lead."-Philadelphia Ledger. required by law in the case of other tickets re-ceived, shall be counted and a return of the same made to the Clork of the Court of Quarter Sessions of he peace of the proper county, duly certi-fied as is required by law; which certificate shall be laid before the judge of said court at the first meeting of said court after said election shall be held, and shall be filed with the other records of said court; and it shall be the duty of mayors of cities and sheriffs of counties, or any other officer whose duty it may be to perform such service, to give due public notice of such special election above provided for, three weeks previous to the time of holding the same, and also three weeks before such election every third year thereafter: Provided, that this act shall not be construed to repeal or affect any special law prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquore or prohibit the grant-ing of licenses: Provided, that when the municipal and township elections in any county or ci y do not occur on the third Friday in March, the elections provided for in this section shall be held on the day fixed for the municipal elections in said county: And provided further, that all license granted after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, shall cease, determine and become void on the first day of April, one thousand eight hundred and seventythree, if the district for which they shall be granted determines against the granting of license; and the treasurer of the proper county shall then re-fund to the holder of such license the moneys so paid therefor, for which the said treasurers shall be entitled to credit in their accounts with the

Commonwealth. SEC 2. That in receiving and counting, and making returns of the votes cast, the inspectors, judges and clerks of said election shall be governed by the laws of this Commonwealth regulating general elections; and all the penalties of said election laws are hereby extended to and shall appiy to the voters, inspectors, judges and clerks voting at and attending upon the election held under the provisions of this act.

SEC. 3. Whenever by the returns of elections in any cit; or county atoresaid. it shall appear that there is a majority against license, it shall not be lawful for any court or board of license commissioners to issue any license for the sale of spirituous, vinous, mait or other intoxicating liquors. or any admixture thereof. in said city or county at any time thereafter, until at an election as above provided, a majority shall vote in favor of license Provided, That nothing contained in the provi sione of this act shall prevent the issuing of li cense to druggists, or the sale of liquors for medicinal and manu.acturing purposes: *Provided*. That the citizens of the borough of Lebanon shall vote upon the question on the third Friday of March. one thousand eight hundred and seventy three. on the same day and time when the townships of the county of Lebanon hold their spring elections. his qualifications, and il he claim to have resided in the State for one year or more, his oath shall not be sufficient proof thereof, but he shall make STE proof by at least one competent witness who shall be a qualified elector that he had resided in the district for more than ten days next immediately preceding such election, and shall also himself swear that his bonstide residence, in pursuance of Quic his lawful calling, is in said district, and that he did not remove into said district for the purpose of voting therein. Every person qualified as aforesaid, and who shall make due proof if required of his residence

and payment of taxes as afore-aid, shall be admitted to vote in the township, ward or district in which he shall reside. If any person shall prevent or attempt to pre-

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vent any officer of any election under this act from holding such election, or use or threaten any violence to any such officer, or shall inter rupt or improperly interfere with him in the execution of his duty, or shall block up the window. or avenue to any window, where the same may be holding, or shall riotously disturb the peace at such election, or shall use any intimidating threats force or violence, with design to influence andu ly, or overawe any elector, or to prevent him from voting or to restrain the freedom of choice. such person, on conviction, shall be fined in any sum not exceeding five hundred dollars, and be imprisoned for any term not less than three or more than twelve months; and if it shall be shown to the court where the trial of such offence shall he had that the person so offering was not a resident of the city, ward, district or township where the offence was committed, and not ertitled to vote therein, then, on conviction, he shall be

sentenced to pay a fine not less than one thousand dollars, and be imprisoned not less than six months nor more than two year The said special election shall be held in each

ward, horough, township and district of the county at the same time, and between the hours fixed by law for holding the annual municipal and township elections in the respective districts. The inspectors and judge of the elections shall meet at the respective places appointed for hold-ing the election in the district to which they respectively belong at the time fixed by law for opening the annual municipal and township elections in said district, and each of said inspectors shall appoint one clerk, who shall be a qualified voter of such district.

In case the person who shall have received the econd highest number of votes for inspector shall not attend on the day of any election, then the person who shall have received the next highest number of votes for judge at the next preceding election shall act as inspector in his place. And in case the person who shall have received the highest number of votes for inspector shall not attend, the person elected judge shall appoint an inspector in his place. And in case the person elected judge shall not attend, then the inspector who shall have received the highest number of votes shall appoint a judge in his place, and if any vacancy shall continue in the board for the space of one hour after the time fixed by law for the opening of the election, the qualified voters of township, ward or district. for which such officers

have been elected, present at the place of election shall elect some of their number to fill the va-

In case any clerk appointed under the provisions of this act shall neglect to attend at any election during the said year, it shall be the duty of the inspector who appointed said clerk, or the person filling the office of said inspector, to forthwith appoint a suitable person as clerk, qualified as afore said, who shall perform the duties of the year. It shall be the duty of the several assessors respectively, to attend at the place of holding every eneral, special or township election, during th whole time said election is kept open. for the pur pose of giving information to the inspectors and judges, when called on, in relation to the right of any person assessed by them to vote at any elec-tion or such other matters in relation to the asessment of voters as the said inspectors, or either of them, shall from time to time require.

No person shall be permitted to vote at any elecion, as aloresaid, other than a freeman of the age of twenty-one years or more who shall have resided in the State at least one year, and in the election district where he offers to vote at least ten days immediately preceding such election, and has within two years paid a State or county tax, which shall have been assessed at least ten days before the election.
