POLITICAL.

The Massachusetts House of Representatives has rejected the Woman Suffrage resolution by a vote of 142 to 83. The President on Monday of last week, nominated David Tidball, Esq., as postmaster of New Castle, for a period of four years. The nomination was promptly confirmed by the Senate.
