

GENERAL NEWS.

C. J. Hoffman has been re-elected President of the Philadelphia Chamber of Commerce. About \$100,000 in silver went to Europe Friday from New York. Senator Carl Schurz sailed for Bremen Friday in the steamer Deutschland. Canal navigation to New York State opens May 15th. The strike among the Crippleas at Cincinnati, is substantially ended. A considerable party has developed in California who insist on greenbacks being used there as a circulating medium. The probabilities are Domiguez will be the next President of Hayti. The Assembly opened on the 29th ult. The Wolland Canal is unusually low and a number of vessels are aground in the long level at Wolland. It is four feet below the usual spring-level. Ex-Governor William Pickens died at the residence of his son, Richard Pickens, in Edwards county, Illinois, of apoplexy. The steamships Baltic, Farina and City of London sailed yesterday for Europe from New York. Heavy frost occurred at Knoxville, Tenn., Friday night, killing the peaches and greatly injuring the wheat. A special despatch says the town of Marianna, Ark., was nearly destroyed by fire on Thursday. Total loss, \$20,000. Adam Campbell was killed at the Big Mountain Colliery, near Shamokin, Friday morning, by a fall of rock. Chinesemen are pulling wagons in the streets of San Francisco, in consequence of the prevalence of the epidemic. The members of the Cripple Society in New York are organizing for a strike, which, it is believed, will begin on the 15th of May. Arrangements have been made for a grand demonstration at San Francisco upon the arrival of the remains of General Canby at that place. Mrs. Heensy, the woman who murdered her two children in a fit of religious frenzy on Wednesday evening, in New York has been taken to a lunatic asylum. Thomas Doyle, mate of the steamer Grand Tower, was murdered by a negro named Ranter, on Friday, below Cairo, while the boat was under way. The negro escaped. A town on the St. Francis river, Ark., containing a population of 4,000 persons, was nearly destroyed by fire on Thursday night. The loss will reach \$30,000, but little insurance. Memphis Life and General Insurance Bank, of Memphis, Tenn., D. P. Malloy, president, suspended yesterday morning. Liabilities, \$25,000. Said to be fully covered by the assets. President Grant and party stopped in Lawrence, Kansas, two hours, on their trip to Colorado. Dispatches received in Washington from all parts of the Indian country show that the hostility of the savages is gradually thickening. The Cleveland Club has just announced its program for the summer races, to begin July 29th, and continue four days. The premiums aggregate \$20,000, and are divided into eleven purses. A cannon weighing 1,950 pounds has arrived at New York from Berlin, as a present from the Emperor to the Lutheran Church at Titusville, Pa. The cannon was captured at Sedan, and will be cast into a bell for the church. A family named Henry, consisting of father, son and daughter, residing near Germantown, Ohio, were poisoned on Wednesday, supposed from arsenic put in their coffee by persons unknown. It is expected that the War Department that General Davis, who left San Francisco for the Mexico country, will arrive there "and assume command of the troops Monday morning. It is denied at the Indian Bureau that Cochise, the Apache chief, is off his reservation, committing depredations. When last heard from, a short time ago, he was still on the reservation on which he had been placed by General Howard, and expressed his intention of remaining there.


