

## GENERAL NEWS.

—Just as soon as Train and Sergeant Bates got quiet, Gordon felt compelled to break out. Edward Payson Weston will probably soon go into a state of eruption.

—Gen. Hawley and Gen. Devens grand commanders of the Grand Army of the Republic, are to address the Vermont soldiers at their reunion in Rutland in August.

—A Green Bay man called a young lady his "precious darling little honeydew of a blooming rosebud," and then stood a breach of promise suit before he would marry her.

—St. Paul has a curious Police Justice. He recently fined a woman three dollars for disturbing the peace by wailing over her husband's broken leg.

—Rev. Norman McLeod resigns the charge of the Congregational church in Salt Lake City. He founded the first Christian church in Utah, under circumstances calling for the highest degree of prudence, self sacrifice and fortitude.

—A Mrs. Fitzpatrick, of Ripley, Tenn., was outraged by a negro named Charles Titus, who, after accomplishing his devilish purpose, fell into a drunken sleep. Mrs. F. alarmed the neighbors, who secured the miscreant and lodged him in jail.

—A daughter of Col. Bibb, of Corinth, Miss., was burned to death by the explosion of a can of kerosene which she was using to kindle a fire.

—George F. Chamberlin, of Wino, Miss., chose the railroad track for a sleeping place, and was torn to shreds by a passing train. Another argument in favor of temperance.

—The Iowa robbers are said to be at their rendezvous in Jackson county, Mo. Why don't they capture them, then?

—The live stock dealers of Missouri and Kansas are much offended at the railroad companies for cutting off the free passes, and are discussing the feasibility of shipping their cattle by water.

—A wrestling match has been arranged between John McMahon, American Champion, and Albert Ellis, light-weight champion of England.

—The Chicago Health Officer reports to the Board of Health that the number of deaths during the past week was 352, a decrease of 71 as compared with the previous week. Of the deaths there were 114 from cholera infantum and seven from cholera morbus.

—Frank M. Titus, letter carrier, of Cincinnati, was arrested Tuesday for opening letters. A decoy letter detected him; and a search of his house discovered twenty letters in his possession. He was held in \$3,500.

—Dr. Wm. Nichols, of Boston, has assumed the business management of Professor Agassiz's school on Penikese Island.

—Rev. Bishop Simpson is reported to be suffering from congestive malarial fever at Long Branch.

—Six out of twenty-four Governors of Massachusetts have had names beginning with the letter B, which may be considered a favorable omen for Butler if he is elected.

—The story that Harriet Penimore Cooper, daughter of Fenimore Cooper, the novelist, is writing a history of the Oneida Indians is entirely true, with two slight exceptions. No such history is being written, and there is no such person as Harriet Fenimore Cooper, and there never was.

—The Graphic gives its readers the news that it is about to begin the publication of a translation from Paul de Musset, by Miss Ida L. Greeley, to be followed by an original story from the same pen.

—Stimulated by Charles Francis Adams, Jr.'s recent discourse on the modern statesman, somebody ambitious of fame announces a lecture on the "Ancient Statesman," with Gideon Welles as a "fearful example."

—Longfellow is at Nahant, surrounded by a number of literary friends of eminence from the Hub. The poet lives quietly and exclusively, and is said to decline a dozen invitations daily to dinner parties, &c. His would be entertainers are, of course, considerably annoyed thereat.

—Houston (Texas) Telegraph: "Going aboard one of the Sabine schooners Monday, we found the Captain of the Elwell, loaded with lumber, to be a handsome woman. We have had a good deal to do with both sailing and steam crafts, but must be permitted to say the commander of the Elwell is the prettiest ship captain we ever saw."

—Benjamin Rathbun, who lately died, aged eighty-two, at Fort Washington, Maryland, had a strange career. Prior to 1838 he was extensively engaged in building operations in Buffalo, New York. He then altered forged paper to the amount of over \$2,000,000 and was sent to the penitentiary for five years. Subsequently he was the proprietor of Rathbun's Hotel, New York.

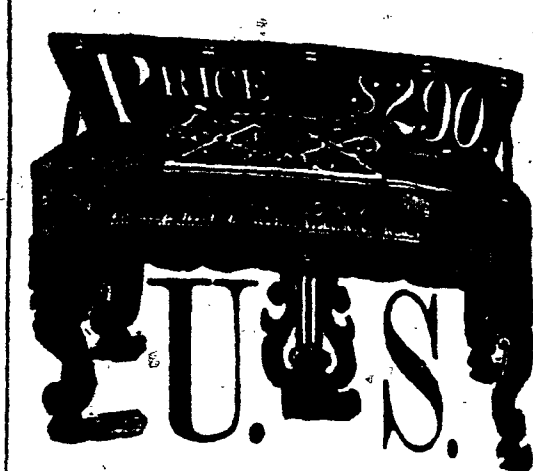
