

NEIGHBORHOOD NEWS.

Berks county has an innumerable quantity of mad dogs. Franklin interests itself in Knights of the cue, of its raising. Apples sold in Waynesburg last week at twenty five cents a bushel. The Philadelphia Centennial Commissioners have already expended \$46,338. Mrs. Susannah Brooks died in Lancaster on the 23d inst, aged ninety-one years. Philadelphia sharpers are counterfeiting Cape May excursion tickets, and are reaping a rich harvest. The corner-stone of a new Methodist Episcopal church was laid in Mauch Chunk yesterday. One young lady in Lehighon has picked four hundred quarts of blackberries this season. The physicians of Elk, McKean, Potter and Cameron counties have formed a medical society. The shoe factory at Lewisburg was destroyed by incendiary fire on the 21st inst. Loss about 8,000; insured. Mrs. Elizabeth Vorse died very suddenly, in Lewisburg, on the night of the 21st inst., of apoplexy of the lungs. William F. Lloyd, cashier of a bank at Wrightsville, has gone to parts unknown, leaving a deficit of \$8,000 in his accounts. Black bass a foot in length and "cat-ties" weighing three pounds can be caught in the Schuylkill at Birdsboro. Messrs. Rosensteel & Son, of Johnstown, carried off the first prize for manufacture of leather, at the Vienna exhibition. A "nice young man" has just "done" the people of Clarion out of about \$500, in the shape of unpaid bills and money raised on forged notes. Governor Hartranft has approved the bill extending the charter of the Somerset and Mineral Point Railroad to Johnstown. The coal mines Ku-Klux, familiarly known as the Molly Maguire, are again sending out threatening letters to obnoxious persons in Schuylkill county. Mr. Jesse Macabee, of Sunbury, had a piece of glass extracted from his hand, the other day, which had been there for twelve years. A man jumped from the third story of the Mansion House, at Ashland, in his sleep, fell thirty feet to the ground, but was unharmed. Pharon Diehl, of Allentown, had a thumb bitten off by a horse, the other day. Well might he exclaim, "the devil's in that horse!" The new directory just issued for Wilkesbarre puts the population of that city at 18,876, an increase since the census of 1870 of 9,802. Samuel Shirk, Sr., fell from his barn in Rothsville, Lancaster county, on the 19th inst., sustaining injuries from which he died on the 21st. His wife was killed by the cars about a year ago. Samuel Klapp, who runs a scythe through the body of George Moyer, in Lancaster county, in June last, has been tried for the crime, and acquitted on the ground of insanity—not of the emotional order, however. The heaviest man in Harrisburg is Mr. Benjamin Slingerly, the obese and good-natured State Printer; and next to him comes the keeper of a lager-beer saloon, who pulls down the scales to 315 pounds. A pair of twin brothers named El-lum, of Waynesburg, cut one hundred logs with a cross-cut saw, in one day, recently, the logs averaging two feet in thickness. Henry Amos felled the trees and trimmed for the sawers. The new Masonic Temple in Philadelphia is almost finished. The dedicatory ceremonies will begin on the 25th of September and continue three days. It is estimated that over 100,000 members of the mystic tie will be present and assist in the ceremonies. A State Grange of the Patrons of Husbandry will be organized in the city of Reading in the course of a few weeks. A grange will also be instituted at Doug-lasville, which will then make eight for Berks county. The Bedford Gazette's "ablest inhabitant," a negro woman named Deliah Fortune, who died recently in that town, was represented to have been 119 years old. It has since been proved by documentary evidence that her age was only 83 years. Seven stables were burned in Sun-bury at an early hour on Saturday morning. For a time fears were entertained that the town would be destroyed, but by hard work the firemen gained the mastery and subdued the flames. Lizzie Gilgote, residing in Lancaster city, attempted to strangle off this mortal coil by taking a large dose of laudanum. She was discovered and physicians immediately summoned, who attended to the requisite wants. The officers and managers of the Somerset County Agricultural Society are actively engaged in arranging for the coming Fall fair. The grounds at Somerset are being rapidly repaired, and every accommodation will be given exhibitors of stock and other articles. Ex-Governor Curtin, Col. John W. Purney, and Edgar C. Swan are among those invited to deliver the addresses.
