Notice to Supervisors.

AN ACT for the removal of obstructions from certain navigable streams in the counties of Huntingdon and Centre.

SECT. 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and house of representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,

That from and after the first day of August next, it shall be the duty of the several supervisors in the counties of Huntingdon and Centre, to examine the streams within the bounds of their respective townships, which have been or shall hereafter be declared by law to be public highways, and to remove therefrom as often as they shall exist, at the expense of their several townships, all obstructions occasioned by trees falling into the same, or by drift wood, or by trees or the limbs of trees overhanging the same, so as to endanger the passage of craft descending said streams, in the same manner and under the like penalties for neglect of duty as is prescribed for the making and repairing public roads and highways.
