By the brig Greek, Smith, from Santa Martha, we learn, that the Spanish general Morales had retreated into Maracaybo, where he remained shut up; he had lately lost 600 men in a sortie. President Bolivar was expected there from Bagota. The fall of Maracaybo and Porto Cavello was looked for daily.

From the Boston Evening Gazette. RUSSIAN CLAIM.

It is now for the first time made known that the Russian government have actually undertaken to carry in to effect their preposterous claim of sovereignty over land and sea, within certain latitudes, on the north west coast of this continent. We use the term preposterous, because in this age of the world it is not a little ridiculous, as well as bar barous, to assume a sovereignty over any part of the main ocean. Such an assumption we are convinced has never been attempted by any christian potentate for more than two centuries, or since the establishment of the freedom of the seas, by the treaty of Utrecht in the year 1712.

The trade of the United States in furs on some parts of the coast within the prohibited limits, has heretofore proved extremely profitable, and a vast deal of property growing out of this traffic is transported to China, and thence brought home in teas, silks and nankins to this country. The merchandize imported into Canton, from the north west coast and the Sandwich Islands, is disposed of for about two-fifths of the whole amount of imports in American vessels, from every part of the globe. This is too valuable a commerce to be excluded from by force. No doubt the emperor Alexander is determined to risk his credit as a statesman, for the purpose of protecting the trade of his favorite north west company, whose privileges almost amount to sovereign power, both in Russia and out of it, within their trading districts. But it remains to be seen whether the naval powers of England and the United States will patiently submit to this flagrant attack upon the freedom of the seas. The assertion of a wide territorial sovereignty by Russia is upon grounds not only not supported by facts, but quite untenable in argument.

From the New York Com. Advertiser. PIRACY.

The brig Transit, Gillet, has arrived this morning, in 20 days from Trinidad de Cuba. One of the passengers is a captain young, late of the schooner Lady's Delight, of Baltimore, which vessel had been captured by a piratical vessel called the Saragosa, commanded by captain Arragonalza. She had since captured two American brigs, and a French ship, and took them into Orange harbor, on the north side of Cuba. The news of these piracies having reached the United States frigate Essex, lying at St. Jago de Cuba, she sailed immediately in pursuit of the pirate, which mounts one long brass 18 pounder on a pivot, five 12 pounders, and 2 long 9's taken from the Lady's Delight.

(The above pirate was captured the 31st ultimo by the boats of the British frigates Tyne and Thracian, in the port of Mata; ten of the pirates were killed and twenty-eight captured.) The United States brig Enterprise, Lieutenant commandant John Gallagher, bound on a cruise against the pirates, has dropped down from the navy yard, and lies as anchor off Old-slip, awaiting the arrival of Thomas Randall, Esq from Washington, who is going to Porto Rico from our government.
