From the Baltimore Patriot, Oct 24
At a Court of Oyer and Terminer, held at Albany, New York, the last week, Dr. D. W. Sackrider, for forgery, was sentenced to confinement in the state prison for 14 years at hard labor, first three months solitary. This, says the Albany Advertiser, perhaps was one of the most remarkable convictions that ever was heard of. After the counsel for the prisoner had closed their remarks to the Jury, and left the court room, and after the district attorney had closed his remarks, there was but one opinion by the spectators, the bar, the court and the Jury, which was, that the prisoner would be acquitted, without the jurors leaving the box. When to the astonishment of all, the prisoner requested of the court to be indulged before they charged the jury, to examine one more witness, who was then in court, and whom he had forgotten to call before. The court indulged the prisoner—the witness was called and sworn, who not only convinced every person present of the prisoner, but even on that very day he had been guilty of forgery, by making an endorsement on a paper which the witness had given the prisoner that day, and upon which before there was no endorsement. The court then charged the jury, and in a few minutes the prisoner was found guilty.

Demarara—The Royal Gazette, published at Demarara, files of which have been received at Boston to the 22d August, contains the official accounts of the military operations against the negroes. By these it appears that there had been engagements with parties of them on the 18th, 19th and 20th, in each of which they were repulsed with great slaughter, while none of their assailants were killed. In the affair of the 20th from 1500 to 2000 negroes were engaged, who were dispersed with the loss of 100 to 150. The sudden check it is added, which the rebels had received at all points, had so broken their spirits, that the greater part of them along the coast had laid down arms. We have already mentioned the receipt of letters from Demarara of the 1st September, nine days subsequent to the above official accounts, at which period it was stated that the "revolted negroes were still in force in large bodies. About 1500 of them were in arms within a few miles of the town, and gave continual alarm to the inhabitants." This does not look like a "laying down of arms," on the part of the insurgents, says the N. Y. Evening Post.
