Any soil that will produce good corn ought to grow roots. The main point is sufficient fertility and pulverization. A sandy loam is generally preferred, because the latter is more readily secured, and with much less labor. It is also sooner dry after a rain and ready to work at odd spells, when something to do is wanted to fill up the time. On such soils it is easier and more pleasant harvesting roots, while they come out cleaner, and, after a little drying, most of the adhering soil will rattle off in handling .-Sandy loams are thought more suited to turnips and carrots, while heavier doams are preferred for beets and mangolds. 
