The wheel must be then re-composed, the tire re-wedged and reset. All this involves a considerable expense and loss of time.

In the present improvement the inner ends of the spokes are secured in an Iron Hub, which consists mainly of two shells fastened together with screws. By simply unscrewing the nuts and taking out the back shell, any one of the spokes may be removed or changed, and the hub again put together, leaving the wheel as soft and firm as ever, and WITHIN THE SPACE OF A FEW MINUTES.

This method of constructing Iron Hub Wheels gives them unusual strength.
