SALE OF THE POOR HOUSE.

The following Resolution was passed by the Locofoco meeting last week:

Resolved, That our members of the Legislature, be requested, at the next session, to urge the passage of a law authorizing the question of a sale of the Poor House property of Bedford county, to be summitted to a vote of the people of said county, and to authorize the purchase of another property in case of such sale being determined upon.

From considerable conversation on this subject with many persons from different parts of the County, we assure our readers that the People's Party of Bedford County is a unit on this question. They all favor the sale of the present Poor House property, and the purchase of a good Farm farther away from town, and off from the public road. No opposition will therefore be offered to the passage of a law for this purpose by our party in the next Legislature. From conversation with the member of the Legislature, from this county, Mr. Williams, we pledge his earnest and cordial efforts for the accomplishment of this object. If the matter is properly carried out, and the right kind of a property secured, it will be much better for the tax-payers, and for the paupers also.

Majority for Davis, For the first four offices above, the candidates opposed to the Republicans were supported by a Union of the Americans and Demoerats, three of whom, it will be seen, are elected, and for the remaining five offices, the successful candidateswere supported by the Republicans and Americans.

It will be seen that Jones, Democrat, for whom the Americans voted, received 25,387 more votes than Church, whom they did not support; that Dinciston, Republican, whom the Americans indorsed, ruceived 21,723 more votes than Leavenworth, who received only Republican support. So that the Brooks-Americans appear to have cast about 25,000 votes for the Utica ticket.

It will be observed that Leavenworth, who received only Republican support, has about 3,000 more votes than were cast for Gov. Morgan last year, while Church's vote is about 3,000 less than that of Parker, who was beaten by Morgan by 17,000.—N. Y. Tribune.
